

## FEDERAL HELP FOR BUILDING SCHOOL ASKED

Sheridan—At a special school meeting of district No. 48 Wednesday night in the high school auditorium for the purpose of electing a director to succeed Clayton M. Atwood, chairman, resigned because of having moved out of the district, S. M. Johnson was elected to fill the unexpired term of approximately a year. Only two candidates were in the field, S. M. Johnson, the candidate supported by the chamber of commerce, and Hal Faulkner, son of pioneer parents of Sheridan.

Mrs. Roy Malo, the newly elected member in June, Dr. Roscoe C. Field and the chairman, Clayton M. Atwood, with the clerk, Mrs. H. B. Skinner, were all in their places. Assisting in the balloting were: N. Huntley, R. Bringham and Arthur Baird.

After election M. Kaufman, president of the chamber of commerce, called upon Dr. R. C. Field to present the matter of the possibilities of obtaining funds for the construction of a new grade school building from R. F. C. funds now available. Mayor Field outlined the efforts that he had already made toward obtaining funds for the construction of such a building and carefully explained the amount needed for such a project, the government's requirements, and the steps necessary for obtaining such funds. He also stated that he felt confident that Sheridan could secure the amount necessary, since the city's finances are in excellent condition.

After a thorough discussion a vote was taken and the board was authorized to investigate the possibilities of obtaining funds and other matters preparatory to a realization of this project. The time for the building of a new school seems most favorable and most necessary and the chamber of commerce is backing the pushing of the enterprise.

## WHEAT PHASE WILL BE MEETING TOPIC

Silverton—According to a statement made by William L. Teutsch, assistant county agent, meetings will be held in Silverton, Salem and Woodburn in the near future in the educational interest of the wheat phase of the agricultural adjustment act. The Silverton section is scheduled for Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock in the Eugene Field building.

The prime object of the act is to operate a wheat growers who cooperate by agreeing to adjust their production by reducing wheat acreage not in excess of 20 percent, and a price for his wheat on a parity with prices of things he buys.

## WOODBURN GROWERS TO HEAR OF WHEAT

Woodburn—Representatives of O. S. C. extension service will hold a meeting at the high school Tuesday starting at 9:30 in the morning, to discuss the question "How can Marion county farmers come under the provisions of the agricultural adjustment act as it applies to wheat?" All wheat farmers are urged to attend. Meetings will also be held at Silverton and Salem.

The plan in general is intended to obtain for the wheat grower who cooperates by agreeing to reduce his wheat acreage by not more than 20 percent, a price for his product on a par with the prices of things he buys. Funds for the payment of the benefit are obtained from a processing tax of 30 cents per bushel. Benefit payments under the act will be made about September 15. No acreage reduction will be required this year.

## Historical Clock Prize Possession Of Silverton Man

Silverton—P. W. Nofsker has an 8-day, key-winding clock that is not only unusual because it was 54 years old March 25, but also because the real owner was Joe Sneathen, boy friend of the Hoosier poet, James Whitcomb Riley.

Sneathen is the barefoot youngster shown with "The Poet with Dog" Smith his fishing partner and Joe Sneathen, who dug worms for them," in the story by George Ade that appears in the September 27, 1930, Saturday Evening Post. The story is "Riley and His Friends."

Nofsker has had the clock since 1905. He came into possession of it at Delphi, Ind., one of Riley's summer vacation playgrounds and the home of Sneathen. Nofsker's uncle, Francis Wilson, a jeweler and watch and clock repairman, gave the clock to Nofsker. Joe Sneathen had left it for repairs, years before, and never came for it.

The clock case is of solid walnut with the side panels of glass. Much "ginger bread" resembling the William and Mary type of decorations adorns the columns and the top in a carved curve. On the back is written: "Patented March 25, 1879. Eight-day, Spring V.P., manufactured by Welch, Spring and Company, Fortville, Conn. U.S.A." The pendulum is gilt adorned with gilt leaves that overhang the bob. A space is cut in the floor of the clock case to permit the pendulum to swing.
