

SCHOOL MOTOR PROBLEMS FACED IN SCIO SECTION

Scio—In view of uncertainty of transportation facilities, or rather, the certainty that the Scio district will have no transportation advantages at the hands of the new non-high school district board, the possibility of organizing a union high school at Scio has been renewed, according to a report current here today.

Elimination of buses would curtail the attendance at Scio high to an enrollment of 60 to 75, it is believed, whereas the highest enrollment last year was 111. Formation of a union high school district here would leave the district board free to provide transportation to and from school. This, of course, is a prerogative of the board under the present arrangement, and it is stated this policy may be resorted to in event a union district is not organized.

Possibility of securing a sufficient number of high school students from districts adjacent to Scio to warrant use of two or three buses has been considered by the Scio board of education, and it is stated that this may be the arrangement in the absence of a union high school here.

Periodically for a number of years the agitation of a union high school for Scio has gained some momentum. The last attempt was made about the time of the dissolution of the union high school at Crabtree. Leading educators of the Scio community have advocated such a course in the interest of high school education in the forks of the Santiam. Several union high schools are being operated in Linn county apparently with satisfaction to taxpayers and educators alike.

The question of the cost and resultant taxes always arises in connection with the proposition, with the result that the movement has never gained much headway here. It is claimed by many now, however, that in order to provide adequate education for many boys and girls who otherwise would not go beyond the grades, either a union high school or special transportation arrangements have become well nigh imperative.

Construction Upon Band Stand Starts

MT. Angel—Construction of the new band stand will be completed soon by the Mt. Angel band. It is being erected at the south end of the lot on Main street owned by the Fred Schwab Commission company. This is the site of the original band stand, which was erected many years ago and which was later moved farther north and still later demolished. A great part of the labor and material being donated by local business firms and citizens, who are boosters for the band. Gus Schnee is in charge of the construction work. The stand will present an artistic appearance and will be a real credit to the city. As soon as it is completed the Mt. Angel band will give a series of Saturday evening concerts.

MONMOUTH PEOPLE WAITING PARASITES

Monmouth—For the benefit of Monmouth people, impatient because earwig parasites are not yet received and paroled out, Mrs. H. W. Morlan, president of the Civic club, announces the order for the parasites was sent in three weeks ago. The Portland office is filling the orders as fast as possible and it is expected all will be accomplished shortly.

A Portland news item states that orders for 12,000 parasitized earwigs have been received from Oregon and Washington cities. The earwigs sold at two cents each in Oregon and three cents each in Washington. When the first parasites were brought to Portland they cost 25 cents each and were imported from Europe. Work of inoculating the earwigs with the parasites has been in progress at the insectary in Portland but it might be several weeks before all are accommodated. The parasite kills the earwig, develops into a fly which lays eggs, which develop into more earwigs, and so the thing continues. The cold weather has held back the earwigs locally, but they are now developing fast.

Moser Tribesmen Gather At Silverton Park With History of Clan Feature

Silverton—The descendants of Joseph Moser and Isabella Dunnigan met for their sixth annual reunion Sunday in the city park naming Earl Moser of Portland as their president for the coming year. A resume of the history of the clan shows more than 700 living members of the family, which now are reckoned in the third, fourth and fifth generations from the original couple. Ten of the children of Joseph and Isabella Moser crossed the plains in 1852, settling in Marion county. Each of the 10 lived to be more than 80 years old, excepting one who died in her seventies. At last year's gathering, three members of the third generation were present, being E. M. Hartman of Wapinitia, Ore., historian of the clan, 85 years old, Joseph Henry Bolin of Coburg, 87, and Albert Whitlock, then aged 79, of Lebanon. Mr. Whitlock passed away during the year, and the other two were unable to meet with the group this year.

The original members crossed the plains in the Jim Dixon train, with Moser serving as captain after Dixon left the Oregon trail for the west in California. Of this family emigrate the Hartmans, Stantons, Whitlocks, Bolins and the Mosers, many of whom are numbered among the prominent citizens of Oregon. The Hartman donation land claim in township No. 6, is yet owned by one of the name, Miss Jane Hartman, and has never been sold, but transferred by deed, only.

Other officers elected were Mrs. Elmer Todd of Molalla, vice-president; and Mrs. Isabelle Scott of Oregon City, secretary-treasurer. E. M. Hartman of Wapinitia, was retained as historian. The members make it a rule of elect a new president and vice-president each year. Gilbert Moser of Silverton, served last year as president, and Earl Moser as vice-president. An unusual coincidence was the presence of one family of the clan, entire, including children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. These were Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Moore of Portland, Willard, Carol; their daughter, Mildred, who is Mrs. Walter Von Luven and her two children, Catherine and Charles; Christopher, their son, Lloyd and his son, Walter; a daughter, Lorena, Mrs. Delbert Savage and daughter, Beverly; a daughter, Cora, Mrs. E. R. Todd and son, Bobby; a daughter, Mabel, Mrs. H. F. Marsh, her daughter, Doris, who is Mrs. Hugh Davis and her two children, Barbara Joan and Sharon; and an unmarried daughter of the Marshes, Delphia, Mrs. D. N. Campbell; a daughter, Alma; and a son, Don and his son, Don, Jr. The wives and husbands of the Marshes were all present making 28 of the one family. E. M. Hartman and Joseph Henry Bolin were made honorary past presidents of the clan.

The program which followed the banquet dinner at noon included an opening address by Gilbert Moser; talk by Charles Hartman on incidents that were a part of the trials and pleasures of those who made the trip across the plains; letters read by Mrs. Scott, secretary, from E. M. Hartman, historian, who expressed a deep interest in the members, and invited them to attend the reunion of the Hartmans in Wapinitia, August 5; short talks were made by Lawson Hadley, O. L. Scott, Mrs. Mary Fane who crossed the plains at the age of 11 years, Chas. Hartman, Mrs. H. Hartman, James Bonner and Willard Moore; a memorial of flowers was dedicated to the memory of Mrs. Mary Moser, a woman who birthday anniversary came on July 15, and who would have been 105 years old Sunday; readings were given by Mrs. Ray Schantz and by Mr. and Mrs. Techenburg.
