The Supple Salem southpaw was in fine fettle, allowing only four hits and striking out an even dozen of the Albany lads. In the third and fifth innings Wilson fanned out all three of the opposition batters.

The star hitter was Chester, the Senator first baseman, who had a perfect day with four safeties out of four trips to the plate, one of them a two-bagger.

Salem scored twice in the first inning. Scales tripled to right and scored on a single by Gribble. Wood flew out. Chester hit for two bases and Gribble scored on a long fly by Manning. Moe went out, Hecker to Dooley.

The Senators scored next in the third. Wood, Chester and Manning all hit safely. Wood scoring on Manning's hit. Chester and Manning were left on bases.

Salem scored again in the fourth. Scales singled, stole second and scored on a single by Gribble. In the seventh Wood singled, stole second, went to third on Chester's single and scored on Manning's hit.

Albany threatened to score only in the fourth and seventh. In the fourth after Jenks had flied out, McClain singled and Hecker walked. Then Wilkinson unfortunately hit into a double play. With one out in the seventh Wilkinson doubled and went to third on a passed ball when Downing took first after fanning. Bault fanned and Dooley was out, Wood to Chester.

Gelman was dining in a hotel in Kyoto when Shaw, on his trip around the world, entered, sat down and wrote out, in French, an order for three eggs. The order was scribbled on the back of the menu card.

Gelman secured the card from the kitchen boy, introduced himself to Shaw, and asked for his autograph. "Autographing and autograph-chasing are terrible habits, and should be discouraged," Shaw said, according to Gelman.

Then he took the card and carefully wrote his name across it.

DE MAGGIO ADDS 3 MORE GAMES AS SAFE HITTER

San Francisco's Joe De Maggio had run his consecutive game hitting record to 53 today, with Jim Olesby of Los Angeles still in pursuit with a 39-game mark.

They got their hits as Los Angeles won one of the three week-end games with the Seals to take the series, 4-3. Dick Ward beat San Francisco Saturday, 8-5, but he took a mauling from De Maggio, who banged out three doubles and a single. First inning singles kept the 18-year-old rookie's record intact as the Seals trimmed Los Angeles, 8-2, and 5-3, yesterday. Olesby collected four singles in the three games.

Sacramento decided Seattle 3-1 Saturday and divided yesterday's twin bill to increase its first place margin to two full games. Bill Hartwig blanked the Indians 7-0 with five hits in the morning game at Stockton. The Burns men bunched six of their nine hits in the afternoon game to turn back the Senators, 7-6. Sacramento captured the series, 5-2.

Hollywood vaulted over Los Angeles and Portland into second place with three week-end triumphs over the Missions, 13-12 Saturday and 13-10, 2-1 yesterday. Rome (UP)—Poultry raisers of the world will meet here in September for the fifth congress. The World's Poultry Science association organized by the Italian ministry of agriculture and forestry, secured the convention. A congress of this sort is held every three years, and the preceding ones took place in Holland, Spain, Canada and Britain.

The purpose is to establish friendly relations among those interested in the development of the poultry industry, through exchange of the most recent knowledge about poultry, the development of scientific poultry researches, and the producing of the best breeds by means of international exhibitions.

Simultaneously with the congress a world poultry show will be held in the Trajan markets. The edifice, buried under a garden and a number of buildings, was unearthed three years ago, and is in a good state of preservation. Since then, it has been used for international and national exhibitions and fairs.

Spiritual Living Need Says Woman

South Hadley, Mass. (UP)—President Mary E. Woolley of Mt. Holyoke college, internationally known educator, believes that "we need more spiritual living in this country than less."

She made this statement after some of her young women students had voiced opposition to compulsory chapel.

This requirement was necessary, Miss Woolley said, because of its influence on the individual, its inculcation of habits of attending religious services, and its use in uniting the student body.

COLLEGE HAS 150 COURSES BY MAIL

Iowa City, Ia. (UP)—C. hundred fifty-one correspondence courses varying in subject matter from the business management of a country newspaper to a study of ancient Hebrew, are offered by the University of Iowa, a report by Bruce Mahon, director of the university's extension division shows.

Students are enrolled in the division from all parts of the world, Mahan said. The courses have been

especially beneficial to teachers in public and private schools. Many have improved their technique and standing to such an extent that their state certificates were raised, allowing them increased salaries, Mahan said.

The university pays the postage for mailing the lessons to the student, who in turn bears the expense of mailing his work back.

Among courses offered are: How to know ferns, inorganic chemistry, labor problems, educational psychology, essay writing, short story writing, literary criticism, Greek, German, Spanish, European, United States and Iowa history, new reporting, principles of advertising,

magazine writing, differential calculus, introduction to philosophy, criminology, the American race problem, and public speaking.
