

SEWAGE PLANT PETITION HAS MANY SIGNERS

Silverton—Action seems to be in order concerning the construction of a sewage disposal plant, and the property owners are expressing a long pent up "feeling" at the way their play grounds for the summer, and their water for stock has been polluted, and are themselves launching an educational campaign even before the general committee from the town organizations has definitely arranged such a plan for the property owner vote on the expression of the proper disposal of the city sewage.

Carl Benson wrote a petition and says that he is proud for the city to know that he wrote it. He states that the community has been built up for several years at the unsanitary treatment Silver Creek, and now that an easy way to make the correction shows up, for one wants to see it carried through. At the time Mr. Benson explained the desire of the people who have homes near Silver creek, he had personally visited 39 homes. Four of the owners were absent, and 32 had signed the petition for the construction of a sewage disposal plant at this time. Benson suggests that this is as near unanimous as is necessary.

The petition to the owners reads: "To the City Council of the City of Silverton:

The undersigned property owners in the Silver Creek district below the city of Silverton respectfully ask you to avail yourselves of the opportunity to build a sewage disposal plant under the Roosevelt Public Works plan.

Many years ago Silver Creek was sparkling stream of pure mountain water, related by our dairy cattle and other stock. It was a favorite of the young people of our vicinity during the summer months and it was also a favorite trout stream. Its changes the otherwise valuable stream into an ooze of sludge, slime and muck.

For many years we have returned this unspeakable contamination from sewage waste which, at the time of low water has caused a condition of unspeakable filth due to the insufficiency of water to properly carry off the impurities which accumulate each season during the months of June, July, August and September or until such a time as the fall rains increase the flow of water.

Unless the proper steps are taken at an early date to remedy these conditions we will feel justified in bringing the necessary legal action for relief."

JUSTICE COURT CASES ARRIVE TWO TOGETHER

Woodburn—Cases in Judge Overton's court seem to be coming in pairs lately, there being two cases of assault and battery filed Saturday and two on Monday for fishing without a license.
