

PARK PROPERTY VIEW CHANGED BY COUNCILMEN

Woodburn—The Woodburn city council reconsidered its previous action relative to the Nick Miller property by unanimous vote at the regular meeting Tuesday night. Petitions were presented from 142 signers asking that the council grant the use of this property for a public park and playground and a plan was also presented by the board of directors of the chamber of commerce.

Mayor Broyles stated that he considered the former action of the council hasty in denying this request of the people inasmuch as the property is valuable to the city at the present time and the public should have use of it if it so desires. After some discussion the motion to reconsider was passed and City Attorney McCord was directed to prepare a resolution to be acted upon at the next meeting designating that the property be used as a public park and playground subject to all times to the control of the council in all things.

A matter was brought up which has caused considerable criticism at the council the past few days. A report has been started that the paving plant for highway construction located at Gervais because the council at Woodburn would not give them a rate on water. This is absolutely false. No application was ever made to the council for water from this source and the plant was located at Gervais because it was the most central point for the work to be done.

The water superintendent was instructed to flush out the mains once each week in the territory where stagnant water is found.

A request for water on Bradley street where a new house is being built was granted.
