

BUSHMEN WIN OVER SENATORS BY 6 TO 1 SCORE

While the Salem Senators played unusually ragged ball, the 6 to 1 victory of the House of David team at Olinger field yesterday evening was due mainly to the hitting of the bushmen when hits meant runs. The Senators got nine hits, as did the visitors, but most of the local runners died on the bases.

Salem's only score came in the ninth inning when Wood and Manning both singled, the former scoring on an outfield fly by Moye.

The major attraction, of course, was the appearance of Grover Cleveland Alexander, famous major league pitcher, who was on the mound the first two innings for the House of David. Alexander doesn't wear whiskers, and, outwardly at least, looks in as fine form as in his palmy days.

George Seales, Salem center fielder, was the only Senator to hit safely off Alexander. It was a two base hit. In his one time at bat Alexander sent a hard bouncer to third which Gribble handled well, throwing him out at first.

When Alexander left the box "Doc" Tally went in for the visitors. Salem had a chance to score in the fourth inning when Wood got a two baser. Then Manning rifled the ball far out into right field. It looked like a home run, but Dexter, visiting right fielder, chased after it, reached a long arm high into the air and pulled it down with one hand. He got a great hand from the crowd and a cheer as he came in from the field at the end of the inning. Johnny Beck was similarly beaten out of a hit in the fifth.

The playing of the House of David was a high degree of entertainment. Tucker, nimble first baseman, does all kinds of clown performances with the ball that keep the crowd in a merry humor. The pepper ball demonstration at an intermission in the fifth inning pleased the fans.

There was nothing particularly wrong with Johnny Beck's performance in the box for Salem. "Squawk" Wilson finished the game for Salem, but this was not because of any weakening by Beck, but to give the Salem southpaw a chance at the hard-hitting trouper.

SHOOT JULY 30 DIVIDES MONEY FORD SYSTEM

The Salem Gun club will be host for the first registered shoot of the season on Sunday, July 30, when about 50 shooters are expected here from western Oregon towns, with the Salem club probably entering 30 or 35 men.

For the first time the O. N. Ford system of dividing the money will be used here, and is expected to add a great deal of interest in the event. Under this system if a shooter breaks 20 birds or more out of 25 he gets 5 cents for each target. If he breaks less than 20 he doesn't get anything. Under this system the shooter who averages 20 or more will go a considerable

distance in getting his money back.

The money of the entrants who break less than 20, together with the entrance fees, will be put in the pot and divided among the high men in four divisions of the money on a 40-30-20-10 per cent basis.

Among towns to compete in the invitational match will be Eugene, Corvallis, Portland, Salem and perhaps some others.

The program will be 100 16-yard targets, 50 handicap targets and 12 pairs of doubles.

Preparatory for the event a practice shoot will be held the coming Sunday.
