The dedication has been set for August 3, the program beginning at 2 o'clock. U. S. Sen. Frederick Steiwer will attend and will be master of ceremonies. Leale M. Scott, chairman of the highway committee, will give the principal address. Senator Willard Mack of Albany will deliver the eulogy at the unveiling of the marker. The unveiling will be made by direct descendants of Jacob Conner and the ceremony will be at the east end of the bridge and the program in the grove across the river at Camp Saniam. Music will be furnished by bands from Salem and Albany. Many prominent Oregon men will be invited.

C. E. Wilson, manager of the Salem chamber of commerce, and H. L. Crawford, also of Salem, were at the meeting. The program committee will meet shortly and more plans will be made.

Work on the temporary span across the Santiam at the Sanderson's bridge site near Crabtree, was started Tuesday morning. The bridge to be used during the construction of the structure will be completed in a few days.

As soon as the temporary bridge is completed, C. J. Montag, contractor, will start work on the new bridge which is to be completed by December 31.

BRIDGE WORKERS AT SANDERSONS MAKE PROGRESS

Scio—A busy construction crew has been operating this week at the old Sanderson crossing on the South Santiam river near Crabtree preparatory to beginning the work of erecting a steel bridge over that stream to replace the old stony bridge that went out during the freshet in the early part of the summer a year ago.

A temporary crossing is being constructed for use during the building of the permanent steel structure, which is to be completed by the first of the new year, according to the contract recently negotiated by the Linn county court and the contractor, J. C. Montag. The temporary bridge will be necessary during the work on the new structure, as materials must be delivered from both sides of the river at that point, it is stated. The crossing to be used during the work also will be heralded by many in that vicinity who have been considerably inconvenienced since the old bridge was swept away by high water last year.

Some of the steel in the old Jefferson bridge, which has just been replaced by a magnificent concrete structure, will be used in the new bridge near Crabtree. Stringers, decking and other material as can be used will be salvaged from recent repairs at Greens bridge for the temporary crossing, it is understood. The Linn county crew will drive the piling, which is to be furnished by the contractor, who also will do all other work in connection with the temporary bridge. The new structure is to cost approximately \$35,000 and will be of material benefit on the state secondary highway between Lebanon and Scio. It is believed also that this sector ultimately will be an important connecting link in the proposed Cascade highway between Springfield and Oregon City, skirting the Cascade foothills and shortening the distance between Portland and Eugene approximately 20 miles, according to sponsors of the proposed north and south route.

SEWAGE PLANT PLAN OUTLINED AT SILVERTON

Silverton—Arthur I. Moulton, attorney of Portland, addressed a large crowd of taxpayers in an educational program concerning the vote to be cast Friday on the issuing of bonds for the construction of a sewage disposal plant for the city of Silverton. The meeting was held in the city park Wednesday evening.

Dr. P. A. Loar introduced the speaker as representative of the citizens' organization committee of which Roy Davenport is chairman. Moulton emphasized the facts that with the increase of population, the disposal of sewage became more and more a sanitary necessity. Pollution of any stream engenders typhoid. That Portland's measure would go through, and now was the most apt time to build the plant on account of the federal donation of 30 percent and reasonable rate of interest on the 70 percent borrowed. Forty years time is allowed to repay, and he specially stressed the fact that the plant itself must pay for itself and no extra burden can be placed on the taxpayers. In time the cities will be compelled to build, as Klamath Falls and La Grande had already come under the compulsion.

The arguments were plainly given and conclusively formulated. The audience was appreciative of the coming of Moulton to Silverton as their guest speaker.
