Oregon Anthology To Be Published

Several Salem poets have written poems which will be included in an anthology of Oregon verse to be published late in August by the New University Press of Corvallis. It will be edited by Dallas Moore.

In this volume of about 150 pages, bound in cloth, will be the best verse written during the past few years by Oregon residents. Many well known writers will be represented, among whom are Anthony Euwer, Eleanor MacMillan, Mable Holmes Parsons, Mary Jane Carr, and Eleanor Allen, as well as many new writers. The book will contain a foreword by Dr. J. B. Horner, of the Oregon State college, and a preface of a biographical nature by Harold Hunt, editor of the Poet's Corner in the Oregon Journal.

The material has thus far been drawn largely from periodicals published in Oregon, but writers whose work has not been read by the compilers may submit material to the New University Press. Preference will be given to short poems, and no poem submitted should contain more than 24 lines.
