Mineral Springs Academy Founder Will Be Honored With Picnic Near Gates

Gates—There will be a picnic held at the Gates school-house in the basement club rooms Sunday, July 30. This picnic will honor an early Gates school man, the late Joseph R. Geddes. A monument that had been erected in his honor by the former students of the old Mineral Springs academy at Sodaville will be unveiled at this date. From 1895 until 1898 Mr. Geddes was president of the Mineral Springs academy. He died November 30, 1927 and is buried in the Fairview cemetery near Gates.

The picnic dinner held in the schoolhouse will be followed at 2 o'clock by the dedication service to both of which the public has been invited.

The alumni of the Mineral Springs academy, headed now by Prof. Jesse Bond of the University of Oregon, have held their annual picnics every year since the closing of the school in 1898. At one of the first of these meetings the students presented Mr. Geddes with a fine gold watch which he still had when he died.

Joseph Geddes was one of the early instructors of this state, coming to Oregon with his family, Mrs. Geddes and three children, from Port Simco on the Yakima Indian reservation in Washington. He had been teaching there but desired to make a change due to living conditions. He left Port Simco in 1894 and came to Salem where he stayed three weeks. He was hired from Salem to teach the school on King's Prairie. The schoolhouse was a small log building which stood at the top of the double hill near Gates. The towns of Gates and Mill City were not known in 1895 and few residents were there. The roads were narrow and often dangerous and were bordered by a heavy growth of timber. Mr. Geddes spent his first winter in Oregon boarding at the home of T. J. Hennel who lived on what is now known as the Gregory farm.

Geddes bought a tract of land near Mill City and made that place his home. Later he accepted the principalship of the Stayton schools, resigning in two years to take the presidency of the Mineral Springs college at Sodaville.

During this time the academy, which had been under the personal responsibility of Louis Barzee, was taken over by the Cumberland Presbyterian church and the name changed from the Mineral Springs college to the Mineral Springs academy. Many students who had gone to school to Mr. Geddes during his years at Kings Prairie and Stayton decided to continue their education at the Sodaville institution. The academy course consisted of a preparatory course from the first through the eighth grades a normal department, a business or commercial course and a classical course. The second year Mr. Geddes' presidency ended.
