

POISON LIQUOR THOUGHT CAUSE OF TWO DEATHS

Albany—Coroner E. C. Fisher began an investigation of the death of Miss, 16 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nels Stenberg, living near Lebanon, under circumstances which the coroner had failed to solve last week.

According to one report the girl drank poisonous liquor while attending a dance. Another report is to the effect that she was poisoned by drinking home brew and eating cherries. Lebanon physicians employed a stomach pump in a vain effort to save the girl's life.

Miss Stenberg was born August 10, 1917. She is survived by her parents, three brothers and two grand-children. The mother is in Minnesota on business but will return for the funeral, which will be held Tuesday afternoon at Lebanon.

Albany—Winford Russell Cobb, 48, of 3144 N. E. Irving street, in Portland, died early Sunday morning, when he was taken from a box car in the Southern Pacific railroad yards, Cobb, according to the report of Coroner E. C. Fisher, had been drinking heavily of denatured alcohol, which caused his death.

YOUTH PROWLERS POSTAL BOXES

Albany—Roger Morrow, 11-year-old Lebanon youth, arrested last week and charged with stealing mail from the Lebanon postoffice, will not be held for federal authorities, it was announced Saturday, when word was received that the government will not prosecute Morrow because of his age.

The lad was taken into custody after he attempted to cash a check and confessed that he took it from the postoffice along with other letters.

Last Sunday morning young Morrow, mailing a letter, noticed that he could reach through a package window and get hold of the mail. According to state police, only a small lad with exceptionally long arms could reach the mail—but young Morrow was the lad. When arrested, Morrow confessed the crime, saying that stealing the mail did not occur to him until he saw the letters in the drop-box. He was released to relatives pending state disposition of the case.

LINN YET DRY; TAX UNPOPULAR

Albany—Linn county voters declared themselves bone-dry Friday in the special state-wide election, voting down the proposed repeal of the 18th amendment to the federal constitution and repeal of the Oregon constitutional amendment.

One of the two counties in the state to remain dry, Linn residents voted 3877 to 2871 to keep the 18th amendment, and cast 3577 votes to 3115 in favor of retaining the Oregon law. Exactly 3577 votes were cast in both cases in opposing the repeal measures.

Not a precinct in the county voted in favor of the sales tax measure. The county as a whole tallied 5140 votes against the bill to 1465 for it. Linn county voted in favor of only one measure, the bonus amendment proposal, by casting 3197 votes to 2699. The other measures on the ballot were all cast aside by some 6000 Linn voters.

Virgil L. McPherson and Perry O. Powell, opposing repeal polled exactly the same number of votes, 1670.

Repeal of the 18th amendment received a majority 223. Dallas and Independence went wet, the latter strongly, but Monmouth went dry decisively.

The state measure received a plurality of 424. The "yes" bracket being given 155 more votes than the federal measure and the "no" bracket 46 less.

The sales tax received scant support and went down to defeat by 35 to 1 polling only 937 votes.

The oleomargarine bill ran behind in practically every precinct and was beaten by 220 tallies. The vote was slightly in excess of 50 per cent.

State Commission Award Contested

Thomas, and while so employed was injured in the left knee on April 27 he was awarded a temporary disability of \$41.60 per month and on June 22 the period was expended by the commission.

The plaintiff, however, is dissatisfied with the final orders and is appealing to the circuit court for a total temporary disability with an award of \$41.60 per month.
