

PLUNDER FOUND AND PAIR HELD IN COUNTY JAIL

Independence—Arthur Fudem, 26, and Coyette Bowline, 20, of Santa Cruz, Calif., were in the toils of the law in this county for stealing and disposing of a bicycle belonging to Arthur Ward of this city. The complaint was filed by the chief of police, Oscar Moore after a close investigation of the case was made by Officers Moore and Mulkey of the state police.

They appeared before Judge McIntosh Saturday afternoon and entered a plea of guilty to petty larceny. They were taken to jail by Constable Schunk, where they are being held on \$500 bail, until judgment and sentence is passed.

In the meantime considerable other articles, including bicycles, garden hose, lap robes, car tools, and incidentals, have been located, and which they have admitted taking. They will probably be held to answer to a charge of larceny to the grand jury, which convenes this week.

Arthur Fudem, the elder of the two men, has served time in a California jail for similar offenses. They drifted into this community several weeks ago seeking work and have been occupying a shack at the Cook Bros. hopyard north of town. The articles stolen were sold to a second-hand dealer in Salem, who is also under investigation by Salem police.

Three bicycles and a number of garden hose and many small tools were taken from one section of the city and it was through the efforts of and assistance of the state police that the plunder was located and the guilty persons brought to justice.

SUNNY SLOPE'S SCHOOL PEOPLE ASK ADMISSION

Monmouth—The patrons of the Sunny Slope school district are knocking at the doors of the Monmouth school district asking for admission.

Petitions are being circulated this week for a special election to be held in both districts August 21 to vote on the consolidation. A recent law makes it financially advantageous for two district to consolidate.

The Sunny Slope district has a higher tax rate than the Monmouth district but the consolidation will lower taxes for all. The expense of conducting the rural district will be eliminated and the extra property, assessed valuation about \$60,000, will also lower Monmouth school taxes.

The Sunny Slope district was carved from the Monmouth and Anti-cip districts about 1894. John W. Fishback, who built a house and was clearing a farm on top of the hill known commonly by his name, was a prime mover in the event. He had a promising family for which school facilities were needed, and as others opened up tracts on the hill, the demand for a school increased. At that time there was no regular road up the hill, only a private trail.

Of recent years the school has dwindled in interest. The children of the neighborhood were all educated and it was at times difficult to keep up sufficient attendance to warrant hiring a teacher. At times children were taken into the district to be taught, and families with children have been encouraged to locate there. For a number of years Mrs. G. R. Crofoot taught the school. At present Mrs. Bernice Cody is teacher and her contract runs for the school year so consolidation cannot take place until 1934.
