

YANKS, SENATOR GIRD FOR FIRST CRUCIAL SERIES

New York, July 25 (AP)—The American league pennant race, the most bitterly contested in years, was at its competitive peak today because:

(1) Washington, a determined, hard-hitting young club, again was in the lead.

(2) Only a half-game behind, the rallying New York Yankees were resuming play on the road, at Boston, where in June they started their worst slump in three years.

(3) Both clubs were fighting hammer-and-tong to gain any advantage before meeting in the season's first "crucial" series at Washington on Thursday.

Appreciating this intense rivalry and the smoldering ill feeling between the two clubs, President William Harridge of the American league arranged to be present during the series at Washington in case of a renewal of their fistful feud.

Leaving no stone unturned in the Yankee drive, Manager Joe McCarthy yesterday bolstered his pitching staff by the acquisition of George Uhle, former Cleveland and Giants pitcher. He will report to the club at Washington.

WALTONS TO MEET AT SILVERTON, 1934

Silverton—Attending the three-day state convention of the Isaac Walton League from the Silverton organization, were Ed Overlund, Archie Wiesner, Dr. P. A. Loar and Roy Davenport, Friday, Saturday and Sunday in Portland. Silverton has been named the meeting place for the annual convention next July, with John B. Schiner of Tillamook as president, Arthur M. Fish of Portland, vice president, and W. A. Davidson of Portland, secretary.

Dr. Loar served on the resolutions committee, the report of which recommended a copy of a resolution be sent to national headquarters. The contents asked that no north and south roads be constructed for general travel in the Cascade area, but that money be used in making the east and west highways. The committee members feel that the North Santiam region should be kept in its primitive state for range of wild game. Suggestion was made that men be employed for constructive work in preserving the forests, instead of destructive to natural growth of trees and shrubs. Copies were to be sent directly to President Roosevelt, to the district forester and to the league's national council.

FRISCH MAKING DEBUT AS HEAD ST. LOUIS CLUB

St. Louis, July 25 (AP)—Frankie Frisch, one of the few collegians to jump directly from college campus into big league baseball and stick, will make his debut as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals today against the Cincinnati Reds.

The Fordham flash was named pilot of the Redbirds yesterday, succeeding Charles E. "Gabby" Street, who had been at the helm of the Cardinals since 1930.

Although eight games behind the league-leading New York Giants, Frisch was somewhat optimistic about St. Louis' chances.

"If we can get the winning spirit," he said, "we may be up there on top in October."

Following his release, Street went to his home at Joplin, Mo., without discussing his future plans, except to deny a report that he was planning to buy the Joplin Western league club.

Meanwhile a feeling existed, the Globe-Democrat today said, that the next man to leave the Cardinals would be Rogers Hornsby.

This feeling was strengthened, the paper stated, when Branch Rickey, vice president of the club,

asked whether the change in managers would affect the status of Hornsby, declared:

"I don't want to discuss that now."

"That would indicate some doubt as to Hornsby's future with the Cardinals?" he was asked.

"I don't know about that," Rickey replied, "but I can't discuss Hornsby's position now."

Hornsby, who led the Cardinals to a world championship in 1926, returned to the club this spring, after being let out at Chicago last summer. After the close of the season, he was traded to the New York Giants in exchange for Frisch.

When Bill Killefer resigned as manager of the St. Louis Browns last week, reports were current that the Rajah might succeed him.
