

AUTO CANNERY TO MAKE CALL AT SILVERTON

Silverton—A special meeting of the city council Tuesday evening, that was primarily to formally canvas the votes of the recent election, developed into an all-out session for new subjects in the order of business, as an regular session.

Much discussion and many explanations concerning the proposed sewage disposal plant were indulged in, and Mayor Garver placed before the aldermen the question of the movable cannery being brought to Silverton as the initial city in the program of canning for 12 towns in the county.

Two important motions concerning the maneuvers necessary as preliminary actions in regard to the sewage disposal plant, were passed. One was that the recorder be instructed to make application for the plan and the other was that the committee be given authority to negotiate with the proper boards and other parties to further plans for the construction of the plant.

Mayor Garver had spent the day in conference with various members of boards in gaining information on how to proceed. He learned that Secretary Palmer of the governor's state board would be in Silverton Thursday to submit plans for a city the size of this, and had stated that Silverton's advance share for such would be \$600. The mayor further explained that three groups of engineers had united to formulate plans for the preliminary procedure in obtaining the sites, locations, outlets and other things connected with the plant. These plans are to be agreed on by the representatives of the council and engineers, then the plans are submitted to the state board and then the R.C.C.

Concerning the portable cannery, the object is to can beans and corn and other vegetables and fruit to be utilized in the homes of those who had formerly depended on the good will stores for their winter's maintenance. Seeds have been furnished and ground for garden and the materials raised by these dependent families will be canned free.

Those in charge desire to place Silverton first on the list and will start registering Saturday. The city must furnish a location where water and fuel can be obtained. It is also desired that a space may be utilized where children can safely play while the mothers are doing the necessary work. The vegetables must be prepared as far as possible in homes to eliminate garbage near the portable cannery. The members of the council discussed the feasibility of a number of vacant lots near the park as the most desirable place. The cannery remains only a day in each town and returns for later canning. The capacity is 2000 cans a day.
