# ALBANY GREETED BRANCH BANKS

Albany—Albany welcomed two new banks yesterday when the U. S. National and the First National banks of Portland opened their new branches for business here.

The First National was the successful bidder for the property of the old First National of Albany. F. E. Callister of Albany, formerly vice president and manager of the old establishment and more recently its conservator, has been made manager of the new branch. John C. Bryant, cashier of the earlier bank has been made assistant manager of the new institution, which has leased the quarters of the old First Savings bank.

R. L. Oren, executive vice-president in charge of unit banks of the U. S. National of Portland, will manage their branch here, with Harry A. Davis, also of Portland, as assistant manager.

By noon Wednesday, \$35,000 in cash had been brought into this city and \$130,000,000, the combined resources of the two parent institutions, made accessible to this vicinity.

Since the bank moratorium this spring, Albany banks had been operating on a restricted basis. An attempt was made to organize a new local bank out of the assets of the two former institutions, but conflicting interests prevented. More than 200 local business men then petitioned the U. S. National to establish a branch here. In the meantime the First National had declared its intention of doing likewise. Both banks were granted charters last Thursday.

# PAGEANT HELD AT MONMOUTH

Monmouth—"Westward Ho!" a pageant in five episodes, created and presented by the training schools of the Oregon Normal school was greeted by a large, appreciative audience on the Normal school campus Wednesday forenoon.

A colorful parade of covered wagons, Indians, trappers, sailors, Mexicans and Jess Applegate's wagon train of 1943 was given on the streets of Monmouth prior to the giving of the pageant which was presented among the large campus trees, supplemented by smaller ones to give just the right background for the elaborate exhibition of Indian and pioneer days.

In the first episode, "Indian Life Before the White Man Came," was made realistic by songs and tribe dances, peace-pipe ceremony and pantomimes of the Cayuse and Blackfoot tribes. The second act, heralded the coming of Jess Applegate's wagon train of 1943. The third scene depicted stirring events at Sutter's Fort, a supply station for immigrants and the discovery of gold by Marshall. Life at Fort Vancouver on the Columbia, a Hudson Bay station was covered in the fourth episode and in the fifth the audience was suddenly brought back to the present day by a group of Oregon songs and a beach ball drill presented by a group of bathing girls.
