

SEWAGE PLANT GROUP STARTS EARLY ACTION

Silverton—Mayor E. W. Garver has selected P. L. Brown, Hugh Range and Charles Reynolds as committee members to aid in numerous investigations and decisions concerning the preliminary in arranging for the sewage disposal plant.

This committee schedule was ordered by the aldermen at the special session of the city council Tuesday night. Mayor Garver is to head the group.

The general committee appointed several weeks ago of which Roy Davenport is chairman that has the "large" program for the construction of the sewage disposal plant in hand and are working on the educative line of anti-pollution of streams, were in receipt of a letter yesterday from W. T. Lambert, chairman of the Portland anti-pollution council, expressing the approval of the council on the progress already made in Silverton.

Lambert told of the \$200 advance for the primary survey plans in connection with the Silverton work.

Burton Palmer, secretary to the governor's board, was the first official scheduled to meet with the mayor's committee. Thursday afternoon to assist the local authorities in the initial steps for procedure.

Plans are to be submitted to the board of engineers, the governor's board and the federal R. F. C. organization for final approval incidental to the main labor of construction of the plant.

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AUTO CANNERY TO MAKE CALL

Turner—Canned food will be available to all families who have been assisted during the past by the Marion county relief committee if they will assist by their own efforts in gathering the raw foodstuffs according to the following announcement by Helen B. Hamilton, who is connected with the relief work.

After the first of August there will come into Marion county a portable pressure cannery which will can the surplus produce of beans and tomatoes and possibly meats for those families who have had relief during the past year.

Fine gardens have been grown from the seeds given last spring to these families and everyone who had relief is expected to take advantage of this opportunity. If families do not have a surplus in their own gardens they should by all means get out and find it between now and the time that the cannery will operate in their communities. Supplies next winter will depend on self-help this summer.

A total of 25 cans will be allowed to each member of a family, and a small toll of one out of every five cans will be retained. However, no one may can who does not register. Registration will be done July 27, 28 and 29 at both Turner and Marion. Inquire at the postoffice. Families may register at the place nearest their homes.
