

DELAYED PLEAS TO BE ENTERED COURT, MONDAY

Dallas—Seven of the nine men indicted by the grand jury early this week were arraigned Friday afternoon with only one plea being entered. Joe Greider of West Salem, pleaded not guilty to a statutory charge but no date was set for his trial. Martin Ferry of Salem is his attorney.

Arthur Padem and Coyette Bowling of Independence, indicted on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling in connection with the robbery of the Oak Knoll service station, had not secured an attorney and the court appointed Bruce Spaulding of Dallas to represent them. They were given until Monday at 1:30 o'clock to enter their pleas.

Lee Douglas of Dallas was given until Monday at 1:30 o'clock to enter his plea to two indictments charging contributing to the delinquency of a minor. He has secured Oscar Hayer of Dallas as his attorney.

Ed Butler of Dallas, indicted on a statutory charge, was given until Monday at 1:30 o'clock to secure a lawyer and to enter his plea.

Roy Stalmaker of Independence will enter his plea to a statutory charge at 1:30 o'clock Monday. His attorney is Guy Smith of Salem.

Ed Forrester of Dallas, indicted on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, will also enter his plea Monday at 1:30 o'clock. He has secured Herman E. Lafky of Salem as his attorney.

W. P. Brantley of Dallas, also indicted on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, will be arraigned Monday afternoon.

One indictment returned by the grand jury Wednesday night is still secret.

UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT VOTE SET AUGUST 1

Scio—With a view of testing the sentiment of the legal school voters of district No. 95, which includes Scio, the district board has called a special meeting for 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, to vote on the proposal of forming a union high school district to include with the Scio district about 17 outlying adjacent districts.

Organization of a union high school here has been considered by progressive educators here and in the surrounding rural communities for several years, although the matter has never been put to a vote of the Scio unit, as provided by state school laws.

Rural districts considered in connection with the movement are Richardson Gap, Gaines, Riverview, Billy Den, Jordan, Arnold, Munkers, Sheldahl, Oakview, Franklin Butte, Shindler, Bergen Hollow, Rodgers Mountain, Crabtree, Lourdes and parts of Cole and Mount Pleasant.

Advocates of a union high school district have been contacting people in rural districts for several weeks, and report that considerable favorable sentiment has been found. Accordingly, the Scio school board held a special meeting Saturday afternoon for the purpose of taking the required preliminary steps.

The law provides that the directors of the district in which the union high school is proposed to be located shall first give its qualified electors opportunity to express their wishes. In the event of an affirmative decision, the matter then will be taken up by rural units proposed to be included.

In view of the probable curtailment of attendance at the Scio school by reason of elimination of bus transportation by the newly created non-high school board, resumption of the union high school movement has been conceived with the continuation of a large and growing standard high school for this part of the county as the chief objective.

Silverton Mortuary Improvements Made
