

OVERTON RULES FAMILY QUARREL OUT OF COURTS

Woodburn—A family quarrel was aired in Judge Overton's court Saturday morning when the case of Nick Yachuk, charged with assault and battery upon the person of Andrew Wallace, came up for trial. Relatives and spectators were so numerous that it was necessary to transfer the proceedings to the city hall. Many witnesses were called but their testimony seemed as favorable to the defendant as to the plaintiff and after listening until almost noon Judge Overton dismissed the case, holding that the plaintiff was as much in the wrong as the defendant.

The trouble grew out of an effort of Yachuk to keep his small step-son in order during which he was reported to have struck the child. Wallace, a brother of Yachuk's wife, objected to this and the war was on. Testimony of a number of witnesses on both sides was that Wallace had been drinking. Sam G. Wallace, father of the plaintiff, at whose home the trouble took place, wanted it distinctly understood that there was no liquor in his house that that his son came home drunk. Wallace denied striking Yachuk but the defendant exhibited marks of blows on his anatomy to the judge. Interest in the proceedings was very evident by the sounds of applause and approval coming from the audience as the several witnesses gave their stories.

DeGuire Clan Closely Identified With Early Life Through District

Silverton—The fifth annual reunion of the DeGuire clan met at Hazel Green park Sunday with a chicken dinner served at noon, a large birthday cake baked by Mrs. John Smith of Aumsville in honor of the birthday of Charles Smith. Mrs. Eva Hicks and Edith Grace which occurred Sunday was a special feature of the dinner.

Mrs. Edith Grace was elected president succeeding her mother, Mrs. Henry R. DeGuire of Aumsville. Alvis DeGuire was made vice-president; and Adaline Hubbard secretary. More than 200 years ago the Da' Guerras came from France to America. The name is not only associated with the makers of Oregon's early history but with the formative periods of the Illinois territory, Missouri territory and the area that composed the Louisiana territory. The name has the advantage of many groups that meet to commemorate the traditional events of their forefathers, as they live to be many years older than the allotted span. The ages in direct descent of the heads of four generations closing with Charles Francis DeGuire, totaled 360 years. The great-grandfather of Charles Francis DeGuire lived to be 110 years old. His grandfather 85, his father 91 and he to be 82, having died in Silverton in 1923.

SPELLING IS VARIED

The various ways of spelling and pronouncing the name is not without interest. The original French used Da Guera, others adopted the French spelling of De Guera, and the accepted signature now is spelled De Guire. The generally agreed pronunciation is the last portion of the name to rhyme with "fare." Sunday's event had specifically to deal with the direct descendants of the four sons and three daughters of Francis B. De Guire (1818 to 1909) and Eleanor St. Gemme-De Guire (1825 to 1892), although much in a historical way is known of the father and grandfather of Francis B.

These are John B., who died in 1922; Charles Francis, died in 1920; Mary Clara became the wife of D. R. Hubbard of the Silverton Hills in 1896 and has a grown family of five sons and two daughters residing in the Marquam community; Miss Louisa Philomena De Guire of 1055 North Fifth street, Salem; Miss Clotilda De Guire, born in Nevada as her parents were en route to the west in 1854, living with her sister, Louisa, in Salem; Lewis De Guire, died in 1888; and Henry R. Lewis James De Guire married Jennie Parish at Fussli, Ore., in 1870, and Mrs. Edith De Guire-Grace of Silverton is their daughter. The widow of Lewis James married his brother, Henry R., to whom were born one son and three daughters, Raphael of Salem, Helen Olsen of Clatskanie, Wash., and Eva Hicks and Lorene Thomas, both of Salem.

HISTORY OF INTEREST

Charles Francis De Guire was so well known throughout Marion county and Oregon that a resume of the immediate family history will eliminate from his life, 74 years of which was spent in the town of Silverton and surrounding communities. An uncle of Charles Francis, John Baptiste De Guire, his father's oldest brother, was born at Sainte Genevieve, Mo., in 1810 and died in 1878. He became actively associated with the American Fur company about the year 1832 and trapped in the Rockies under the captaincy of William Sublette. Among his other associates were William, Charles and a short response to the welcome to visitors as did Mr. Redfield of Vancouver, Wash. Mrs. Grace and Mary Matheny gave a humorous reading written by themselves. The young people of the clan indulged in swimming. The 1934 reunion will be held at Hazel Green park the fourth Sunday of July.
