GEOLOGISTS TO VISIT OREGON

Bend, Ore., Aug. 1 (AP)—A party of 50 leading geologists of the world will make an excursion across Oregon on August 12 and 13. It was learned here today, with the fossil beds of the Joan Day basin as one of the objectives. The party, headed by Dr. Ralph W. Chaney of the University of California, will reach Eugene the morning of August 12 and will travel to and across the McKenzie lava fields where glaciation and the so-called superstructure of the Cascade range will be examined.

From central Oregon the scientists will be taken to the newly discovered fossil leaf locality on West Branch creek near Mitchell where the remnants of a mighty forest which flourished in that distant epoch known as the Eocene, will be studied. While in the Mitchell area, the geologists will be taken through the region once swept by mesozoic seas, and later blanketed by Columbia lavas. Marine, mammal and flora fossils are found in this district.

In the Dayville, Picture Gorge and Gray areas of the John Day basin, the scientists will see a region known the world over for its abundant oodocene fauna, fossilized bones of semi-tropical mammals, including the three-toed horse and ancestral camels, which ranged over Oregon millions of years ago.

BODY OF HERRON FOUND IN RIVER

Silverton—While fishing in the Santiam river Monday noon, Charles Gillet, of Portland and Earl Bear, of Turner, discovered the body of Howard M. Herron, 23, who was drowned with John Hess, another C. C. worker, on June 5. The body of Hess, who came west with the Chicago contingent, was recovered two days later. Identification of the body was made by relatives, according to Coroner L. E. Barwick.

The body was found wedged between a boulder and a log and nearly three miles below the point the two young men were drowned. Herron was 23 years, seven months and two days old at the time of his death. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. V. Herron, Lyons, route 1 and living near Gates. The remains are in charge of the Weddle mortuary here with funeral services scheduled for next Sunday.

The value of permits issued during July totaled \$34,842.39, an increase of 136 percent over the preceding month.

MOLEY DENIES HE WILL RESIGN

Hyde Park, N. Y., Aug. 1 (AP)—Raymond Moley, assistant secretary of state, asserted after a special conference today with President Roosevelt on means of wiping out kidnapping and racketeering that he intended "most certainly" to continue in his post in the state department.

Moley indicated considerable trust would be placed by the administration in the new national recovery industrial codes as a method of stopping racketeering among small groups which have sought to enforce agreements by force.

Asked about published reports Secretary Hull was at odds with him on state department policies and would seek his resignation, Moley said, "Those are assumptions and I don't reply to assumptions."

Asked if he were going to continue as assistant secretary of state, he declared "I certainly am. Do you know any good reason why I should not?"

After an all day talk with the president at his family home here, Moley departed tonight for New York and will return to Washington in the near future.

He said he knew of no specific plans by the president to combat kidnapping and racketeering.

SIX MEN SHOT BY GUARDS AT MINE

Uniontown, Pa., Aug. 1 (AP)—Six men were shot and wounded in a battle between pickets and deputy sheriffs at the Star Junction mine of the H. C. Frick Coke company today.

A score of others suffered from effects of tear gas. Pickets said they stopped several men who intended going to the mine and were talking to them on the highway when several deputy sheriffs came up, threw tear gas and opened fire.

Dozens of shots were fired and a number of tear gas shells exploded. After the affray, shells littered the road.

Several bullets went through nearby houses and in one home pickets said a baby narrowly missed death. They said there were many women and children in the crowd and that while none was hit they were made ill by the tear gas.

ANSWER FILED BY WATER COMPANY

Answer was filed in the circuit court yesterday by the Oregon Washington Water Service company to the amended complaint of the city in the suit to test validity of the \$2,500,000 authorized water bonds.

A demurrer by the water company to the city's declaratory judgment action was overruled by the supreme court, and the city now asks declaratory judgment on the merits of the case, and the case is now at issue in the circuit court.

The answer is accompanied by nearly 100 pages of exhibit documents.

Went for Doctor at Birth of Mr. Hoover

Kansas City, Kan., Aug. 1 (AP)—Edward D. King, who went for the doctor when former President Herbert Hoover was born, died here at his home last night. He was 81 years old, and prior to his retirement several years ago, was a furniture salesman.

Mr. King attended school at West Branch, Pa., and one of his school mates was Jesse Hoover, father of the former president. He later worked in the Hoover blacksmith shop, and stayed at the Hoover home.

REFINANCING MORTGAGES ON FARMS SPEEDED

Washington, Aug. 1 (AP)—A county-by-county campaign to speed refinancing of farm mortgages will be undertaken by the farm credit administration, which was authorized to loan up to \$2,200,000,000 to farmers at the last session of congress.

Henry Morgenthau, Jr., governor of the administration, explained today the campaign will be employed to expedite the mortgage refinancing program and to supplement plans already under way in five states for buying up farm mortgages held by closed and restricted banks to aid in their liquidation.

Returning from airplane visits to Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky and South Carolina, he said the program for large scale refinancing will be carried into other states as quickly as possible and that from now on all applications for refinancing will be handled together with the bank campaigns.

He said he is increasing the appraisal staff of the 12 federal land banks from 210 on April 1, to from 2,500 to 3,000 men. Already 803 appraisers have been added and more than 800 more are in training.

Applications from 114,000 farmers for \$400,000,000 in loans have been received in the last two months. The rate is increasing rapidly.

He has arranged to obtain \$100,000,000 from the reconstruction corporation to supplement \$80,000,000 which the land banks had on hand to handle needs for funds during the first months.

DRIVE FOR RELIEF FUNDS POSTPONED

In response to many inquiries directors of Community Service state that the organization is working in cooperation with the federal government, state relief committee and the Marion county court.

That those really in need in Marion county are now being taken care of and will continue to be provided for.

That no drive for funds is to be made at this time, due to the good work now being done by cooperative bodies.

Directors of Community service believe that no solicitation for relief funds should be made until it is seen what effect the national recovery act will have on the unemployment situation.

However, community service will put on a drive for funds this fall, but the amount to be asked for will be held down to the minimum.

OLD IRONSIDES AT ANCHOR AT ASTORIA

Portland, Aug. 1 (AP)—The gallant old frigate Constitution was resting on the Columbia river at Astoria today, 36 hours ahead of schedule on her tour of western ports.

"Old Ironsides" is due at Portland at 6 p. m. tomorrow, to be berthed at Swan Island where state and city officials will welcome her commander and crew. A guard of honor from the Canadian Legion will be stationed at the landing pier.

SCHOOL DISTRICTS FAVOR BUS LEVY

Silverton, Ore. — Reports from two of the four school districts in the Silverton Hills district give approval to adding the cost of bus transportation to the school budget.

Those voting were Porter, yes 16, no 1; and Mountain View, yes 11, no 2. Reports had not been received at noon from either Hult or Silver Falls districts. In as much as the entire district voted heavily in favor of Murray for director and that he stood for high school bus transportation it is regarded here as probable that all four districts will be for transportation.

Find Body of Girl Beaten to Death

Los Angeles, Aug. 1 (AP)—The sheriff's office reported today the body of a young woman who apparently was beaten to death with a hammer, had been found in San Gabriel.

Officers tentatively identified her as Mary Sonihui, 20. They said her head was badly battered.

COLUMBIA DAM TO BE APPROVED

Washington, Aug. 1 (AP)—Senator McNary, (R., Ore.), told the United Press today after a conference with Major Gen. Lytle Brown, chief of army engineers, that he had reason to believe President Roosevelt would approve the proposed Bonneville, navigation, power and flood control project on the Columbia river.

"I discussed the project today with General Brown," McNary said. "The engineers site report was received by the general last Thursday and is being studied by army engineers here. I have reason to believe that their report will be favorable, that the president will be satisfied, and that the project will be authorized."

Senators Dill, (D., Wash.), Stetwer, (R., Ore.), and McNary discussed the project with Mr. Roosevelt at length about three weeks ago and McNary visited the White House again last week before the president left for Krum Elbow. It is understood that Mr. Roosevelt is prepared to approve the Bonneville project if the engineering and economic features are feasible.

It had been hoped that the Bonneville project could be given tentative approval last week along with the Grand Coulee and Caspar Alcorn dams and the plan to deepen the Mississippi channel to nine feet up to St. Paul. But it was impossible to obtain the district engineer's report on the Bonneville project in time to include it with the other three at that time.

WHEAT REDUCTION ORDER NOT ISSUED

Washington, Aug. 1 (AP)—Secretary Wallace announced today postponement until August 24 of his decision setting the percentage of wheat acreage reduction to be asked of farmers in consideration of benefits payments to be paid upon the voluntary domestic allotment plan.

Wallace said he "wishes to give the world wheat conference an opportunity to reach a decision for a reduction of production by all four great exporting nations before the United States embarks independently upon a definite domestic acreage reduction program of its own."

Wallace's order was recognition of a cablegram received late last week asking him to postpone his decision because of new possibilities for an international agreement being reached at London.

200,000 PLACE BLANKET CODE IN OPERATION

(By the United Press) Blanket code agreements became operative throughout the nation today with nearly 200,000 employers immediately swinging into line with wage-lifting, work spreading agreements, a survey by the United Press showed.

The 24 regional offices of the national recovery administration reported that agreement tabulations were about up each hour. Chicago reported 9,000 new agreements received in the first mail.

The blue eagle, symbol of cooperative recovery action spread its wings over the country. Newspaper advertisements featured the emblem of the blanket code program. Cross road stores and huge department stores displayed the insignia in windows.

Regional offices reported receiving certificates of agreement as follows before noon:

PUBLISHERS MAY MAKE NRA EAGLE

Washington, Aug. 1 (AP)—Publishers of newspapers, magazines and other publications and manufacturers of advertising literature or stationery are permitted to have engraved and to reproduce the NRA eagle emblem for clients only on presentation of written statements by the latter that they have signed the president's agreement.

This is provided by a formal regulation issued by the recovery administration to prevent use of the emblem by persons not authorized to display it.

The industrial law's general penalty of \$500 fine or six months imprisonment for violating regulations is applicable to this one also.

On filing the written statement, the advertiser must attach to it a sticker, 1 1/2 inches in size, which he can obtain through his postoffice only upon complying with the agreement.

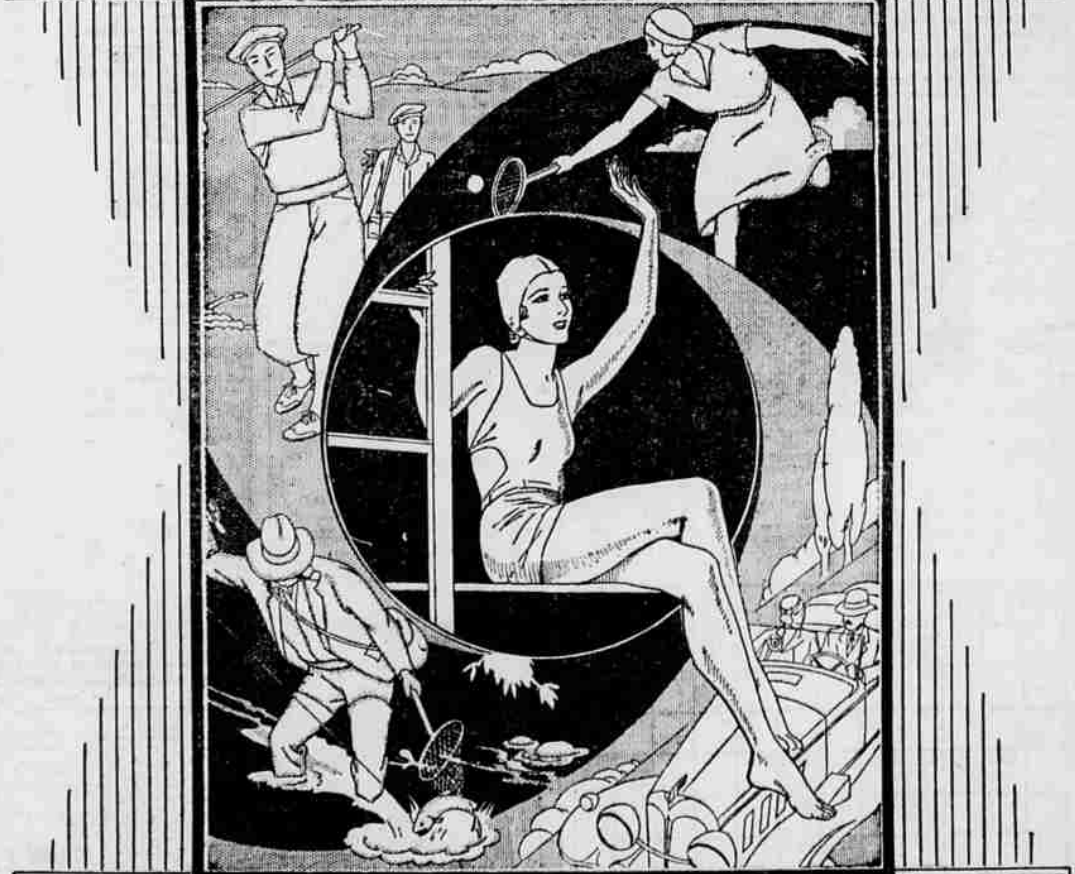
