

STEEL BRIDGE WORK STARTED

Solo—Preliminary work of erecting a new steel bridge at Sanderson crossing of the South Santiam river near Crabtree has been viewed by interested visitors during the last week. The new structure is to be completed by the contractor, J. C. Montag, on or before January 1, 1934.

In view of the fact that high water frequently comes in late November, it is considered that work must be pushed rapidly in order to avoid the floods possible at the beginning of the winter rain season. A temporary crossing has been in use there for a week, replacing the light structure placed there early last summer, which was swept away in November last.

The new permanent bridge will accommodate many farmers who have been considerably inconvenienced since the last crossing was washed away. Greens bridge probably will be closed a part of the time soon during repairs on the approaches there. Some of the material in the old Jefferson bridge is to be used at the Sanderson crossing.
