

MONMOUTH TO VOTE UPON THREE POINT TWO BEER

MAYOR BREAKS ELECTION CALL TIE DEADLOCK

Monmouth—The question of beer in Monmouth, which has long been simmering, came to a boil in the council meeting this week and as a result the recorder is authorized to call a special election on an amendment to the charter, to be held in the near future.

After routine matters had been disposed of a petition was presented to the council signed by 49 legal voters requesting that a special election to be held on the question of amending the charter to permit the sale of 3.2 beer and wine as permitted by recent federal law. After some discussion a motion was made by Councilman Partridge, seconded by Councilman Hilday, that the petition be disregarded. The ensuing vote was two yes and two no.

Mayor Bowerox cast the deciding vote with the no's, the motion thus being lost.

A petition was then taken notice of signed by 125 legal voters, protesting against any change in the charter to make possible the sale of legalized beer and wine and protesting against the holding of a special election.

After further discussion a motion was made by Councilman Cooper, seconded by Councilman Calbreath, that a special election be called on the proposal. Vote resulted two yes and two no.

The mayor cast the deciding vote with the yes, carrying the motion and the recorder was instructed to take steps to call a special election.

A committee from the Civic club consisting of Mesdames Chambers, Dadds and Powell waited upon the council asking that the grass and weeds and parking spaces and vacant lots be cut.

The Monmouth Lumber and Fuel company presented a request for a building permit for a small frame structure to be used as an office building, on land belonging to the Southern Pacific company but now rented by the Lumber company. The proposal was to build on skids so the building could be moved readily, if circumstances arose which made moving desirable. The permit was refused on the ground that the location is within the restricted zone where fireproof construction is required.

The chief of police, Verd Schunk, was granted a week's vacation.

MASS MEETING AT SILVERTON TO FIX HOURS

Silverton—Lynn P. Sabin, assistant manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, was the guest speaker at the mass meeting at the Eugene Field auditorium Friday night, called for the purpose of presenting the code by which agreement as to hours of closing and working hours was decided upon.

Representatives from towns included in a 10-mile radius were present and expressed willingness to cooperate.

Sabin emphasized the N.R.A. as a sociological situation as well as an economic one, and that the people were the only ones to carry it out. He showed that industry, for the first time, appreciates a government regulation.

The hours of operation vary at different places and departments. Sabin said the Portland grocers operated 66 hours a week and others according to their needs.

Another session will be called by the forum in a few days, according to an announcement by Starr.

The committee was unable to definitely form a general code until after last night's explanation by Sabin. Members of the committee are Earl Adams, Frank Spring, Julius Alm Sr., and Mayor E. W. Garver.

An independent petition as to closing hours had been circulated.

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HAZEL GREEN WILL GET CEMENT POOL

The pool will be 60 by 100 feet, the location to be near the baseball diamond which is northwest of the park buildings. When the pool is completed the river will be used for the new motor boat installed this summer. The park has been unusually popular this summer with from 500 to 900 picnickers on some days.
