THREE ACTIONS ARE FILED AT DALLAS

Dallas—Three complaints were filed in circuit court here Friday with the first that of Oscar Hayter, Bertha L. Hayter and others a plaintiffs against Jennie M. Ferguson. The complaint states that on September 19, 1931, a mortgage was delivered to Arthur Clarke and Oscar Hayter by J. C. Ferguson at that time the owner of the real property covered by the said mortgage. The plaintiffs seek to have the rights of both parties fixed by the court and ask for the appointment of three referees having the partition of the land covered by the mortgage with the understanding that the costs of the various items borne by all parties concerned.

Schramm, state superintendent of banks, is filing suit against Alex Kazakoff, Mrs. Alex Kazakoff and Mary Kazakoff, states that the defendants are in wrongful possession of certain property with damage to the plaintiff in the sum of \$50. The plaintiff asks for the restitution of the land, \$50 damages and the costs of the action.

A. A. Schramm, also filed an individual suit against Alex Kazakoff, who he alleges leased land in Bureau Vista from his son on July 19, 1931, at a rental of \$5 per month, the total of which up to July 19, 1933 amounted to \$120, of which sum only ten dollars has been paid, seeks judgment in the sum of \$110 plus the costs of the suit.

It is announced that the same personnel will be retained, with Joseph J. Keber, manager; Alois Keber, assistant manager; Joseph D. Hauth, teller and bookkeeper; and Hilda Eberle, stenographer. Joseph J. Keber has been active cashier of the bank for the past 25 years. John W. Eber and Fred Schwab, retiring president and vice-president respectively were two of the original directors when the bank was incorporated 25 years ago, August 29, 1908.

Other Oregon affiliates of the United States National bank which have likewise been converted into direct branches are the Bank of Oregon City; U. S. National of Salem; U. S. National Bank of McMinnville and the First National Bank of St. Helens.

The retiring directors of the Bank of Mt. Angel are John Scott of Oregon City; John T. Bauman, N. G. Mickel, P. N. Smith, Joseph J. Keber, Fred Schwab and John W. Eber. Fred Schwab was the first president and J. M. Conklin was the first cashier. Joseph J. Keber took over the duties of cashier in October, 1907.
