Two of the longest "singles" of the season were cracked out by Johnny Oravee, second baseman. In the seventh inning with the bases loaded, Oravee boomed out a smash which had home run marked all over it. Unfortunately, Johnny in his haste to get back to the bench once more, overlooked the trifling matter of touching second base so his effort went for a single. The three runners ahead of him scored however. Prior to this Oravee had connected with one of Covert's shots in the third. It was a sure triple. But this time Johnny got off on the wrong foot and overstepped first base. Fortunately he had time to get back to first base before the ball had been retrieved.

The Federals went into a tie for first place with Eugene when they defeated Bend 10 to 8 while the Townies were idle.

The Senators got off to a good start when they scored a run in the first inning. Scales reached first on an error and later tallied on Wood's single. Wilson held Albany hitless

through the first four innings, and scoreless until the seventh. In the seventh the visitors scored three runs on three hits, two errors and a sacrifice. They added two more in the eighth on two singles and an error and checked in the final score in the ninth on two walks, a wild pitch, a hit batsman and a single.

After scoring in the first, the Senators were able to do but little with Covert's slants. They got one hit an inning with the exception of the fourth when they didn't connect at all, until the seventh. In that frame they scored three, thanks to Oravee's "single." CONNIE MACK'S SQUAD PROVES TROUBLEMAKERS

The Philadelphia Athletics, 10 games or more out of the American league pennant race, has caused some bad moments for the contending New York Yankees and Washington Senators as the leaders moved towards today's opening of another "crucial" series.

After handing the second place Yankees three straight defeats to knock them four games out of first place, the A's swung their bludgeons against Washington yesterday and helped reduce the margin to three games. The A's slammed Ed Chapman, making his first appearance for the Senators, off the hill in less than three rounds as Jimmie Foxx helped with his 31st homer. Then after the Senators had taken advantage of the wildness of "Sugar" Cain and Rube Walberg to tie the score, they moved ahead again on Pinky Higgins' homer in the seventh and finished with another burst for a final score of 12-8.

The Yanks, meanwhile, downed the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 4, largely because of Boston errors and George Pipgras' lack of control. The victory left the Yanks three games behind Washington and ten ahead of the A's, who in turn increased their third-place margin to 2½ games as Detroit's Tigers captured the remaining first division berth from Cleveland with a double victory.

After pounding Oral Hildebrand to win the opener, 7 to 3, the Tigers took the second game, 2-1, on a five hit pitching job by Fred Marberry. Charley Gehring hit a homer in each game. Chicago's White Sox and the St. Louis Browns divided the other American league twin bill. The Sox won the first game 6-5 in eleven innings when Red Kress drove in the odd run but

George Blacholder's four hit fling evened the count with a 7-1 St. Louis victory.
