

JUNIOR TEAM GETS SEND OFF AT WOODBURN

Woodburn—The Woodburn Junior league baseball team left Tuesday night amid cheers and music for Klamath Falls to participate in the state finals. Prior to their departure they were given a banquet at the Club restaurant and were then the guests of Manager Foran at the Bunajaw theater. Following the show a rally was held at the armory in their honor, with a large crowd present. Long before the boys arrived there was only standing room left.

The first speaker was Rev. Father Rubis, who was introduced by Sam Yoder, commander of Woodburn post. Father Rubis gave several comments on his life and on the baseball team. Mr. Roscoe of the Monitor trio sang "The Big Base Viol." The baseball committee, consisting of Harold Austin, chairman, Adolph Galt and Dr. John Hanrahan, was then introduced. Chairman Austin introduced all the boys and gave several comments on the boys and told how many years they have left to play junior baseball.

The Hubbard Community band played "The Winner" and Miss Claire Keber of M. Angel sang "When the Roses Bloom Again" and "Shuffle Off to Buffalo." Charles Johnson of Silverton, who was national committee man from Oregon when junior baseball first started and had much to do with its organization, told how junior baseball was started and the object of it. 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HIGH SCHOOL MOVE GAINING WIDER FAVOR

Selo—Backed by the impetus of the recent overwhelming vote of the Selo district in favor of a union high school here, progress in the movement is said to be gaining momentum highly pleasing to its sponsors.

Petitions for the organization of a union district continue to receive signatures of taxpayers, according to those in charge of the work. Sponsors of the movement point out that the plan will not increase the cost of education throughout the districts to be included in the area.

Some who are yet undecided as to the advisability of the movement have expressed the thought that a new school building would be necessary, thus adding costs that should not be assumed at this time. In this connection it is explained by advocates of the union plan that the present school building in Selo is ample for the purpose.

It is further pointed out that five union high schools have been operating in Lin county for several years and in some instances at costs below non-union schools.

As provided by law, remonstrance to the formation of a high school district has been presented to the district boundary board. This is explained, will be the basis for the calling of an election in each of the 17 rural districts proposed to be included in the high school district. It is understood that the election will be arranged in due course by the boundary board, which consists of the county superintendent, of schools and the county court. The judge of the court is chairman and the superintendent is secretary of the district boundary board.

SALEM QUARTETTE TO SING IN DALLAS
