BOY FARMERS TO PARTICIPATE IN STOCK SALE

Silverton—The present and prospective Future Farmers of America members are being reminded by cards that the second annual market day event is to be held at the Portland Union stock yards Thursday, August 17. The day is to be given over to the cooperative marketing of swine and sheep.

All local students interested in the affair are asked to meet in the agricultural class rooms Monday evening, August 14, at 8 o'clock to complete final arrangements of getting their stock ready for the selling day. Every boy is urged to take his father on this educational trip to see how stock is marketed and visit the industrial plants. Transportation is a large problem and the boys are asked to cooperate in getting the stock to the market. There will be stock judging contests at Hillsboro, Gresham and Canby fair grounds.

Grover Lichty is secretary of the Silverton Swine Breeder's association, a high school boys' organization. The boy may see his hog or sheep taken in, weighed, graded and sold. He receives his check while at the yards. He also hears conversation concerning his animal, telling the rating of the grading, why the top price, or graded down which is the main educational feature of the venture. A free noon lunch will be served the visitors at the Red Steer cafe by the Portland Union Stock Yard association. Numerous talks and a program will be given during the luncheon hour under auspices of the leading livestock men and commission employees of the yards.

President A. I. Peterson of the association is responsible for the success of the cooperative marketing activities of the boys and is one vitally interested in the high school live stock producers. The affair is under the leadership of Earl R. Cooley, state supervisor of agricultural education.

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HALLETT ADDS NEW GLADIOLUS

Silverton—Harvey Hallett, gladiolus grower of Silverton, has at last a dream of many years come true in a clear transparent flesh pink seedling that he propagated, and as yet is named only as No. 5. It has a wonderful placement on the spike, which is 53 inches in length. The florets average five inches across. The blossoms resemble the Rita Beck without the scarlet stripes in the throat. The new "glad" has bloomed last fall and this summer. The first spike has already matured and the second one is coming on. Hallett has a later blooming white "glad" well established from a seedling that he is looking for excellent results from the experiment. He does not aspire to a garden of large proportions but he has assembled the outstanding ones in the United States and collected the cream of the east and west in his growings.

Two of Hallett's best appreciated "glads" are the Picardy, a light salmon apricot colored floret which is outstanding in perfection but not in novelty. The blossom that is a novelty is the Blue Admiral, a deep rich sea blue.

From the gardens of two well known growers, Hallett specializes in the propagation of the Reverend Christ of Ohio in his produced seedlings called the Smiling Maestro, Star Prince, Lavathan, Sun God, Richard Wagner and Franz Schubert. The other is Ellis, of Canby, originator and grower of The Oregon and Golden Chimes.
