

ALL WOODBURN CELEBRATES JUNIOR TEAM VICTORY

STATE CHAMPS GIVEN HEARTY FAN WELCOME

Woodburn—A celebration which rivalled the one following the armistice was in progress here today as local residents turned out en masse to honor members of the victorious American Legion junior baseball club—winners of the state championship at Klamath Falls Friday afternoon. Although the youngsters reached the city via Southern Pacific trains at 7:20 in the morning, a number of fans were on hand to greet the club. Practically the entire population would have turned out if some definite plan had been known in advance as to the time of the boys' arrival.

The juniors were taken to a local restaurant where normal appetites were quickly satisfied and where this tough game with Grant of Portland was played and replayed in conversation.

The chamber of commerce will honor the youngsters by a banquet as soon as arrangements can be completed.

The team expects to leave next Wednesday night for Pocatello, where it will participate Friday and Saturday in the northwest regional tournament. It is hoped an exhibition game can be arranged with the Grant team in Portland probably next Tuesday. This contest will probably hinge on whether Vaughn street can be secured.

The big silver trophy, emblematic of state championship honors, was in possession of the junior team when it reached Woodburn this morning. It will be given a prominent place in a downtown show window, where it can be seen by all fans.

The club, which is composed of boys from various parts of the county, is conceded to be the best developed in this section since junior play was started a number of years ago. Its pitching staff is excellent while the infield is well balanced. The entire group had no superior as a slugging outfit.

Klamath Falls, Ore., Aug. 12 (UP)—Woodburn's American Legion junior baseball team reigned as state champions today as a result of a close defeat over Grant High Pharmacy team of Portland here yesterday.

The Portlanders lost their chances for the right to represent Oregon in the regional playoff at Pocatello, Idaho, when Woodburn squeaked a ninth inning rally. The score was 5 to 4.

Each team tallied twice in the first inning, then remained scoreless for five innings. Woodburn forged ahead in the seventh with a series of hits, pushing one run home. Two more were added in the eighth when Millard, Grant, walked two batters.

Grant made a valiant effort to grasp the lead in the final inning, scoring two runs. Bevins, Woodburn pitcher, struck out the next Portland matter at the plate, ending the game.

Woodburn beat Eugene, 8 to 3, Thursday to go into the finals bracket, and Grant swamped Hood River, 21 to 11.

The games were an added feature of the state convention of the Oregon American Legion here.

FUNDING BONDS SANCTIONED IN INDEPENDENCE
