

### MEIER ASSERTS STATE TO STAY INSIDE BUDGET

Marshfield, Ore., Aug. 14 (AP)—Oregon probably will be able to keep well within its budget for the current biennium in spite of increased costs of supplies and commodities, Governor Julius Meier declared here Sunday. The budget is approximately 40 percent under the previous appropriation.

Governor and Mrs. Meier planned to stop at Newport last night. They were enroute from the American Legion convention at Klamath Falls to Gearhart where the state executive said they would spend several days resting.

The governor declared he was exceptionally gratified at the strides which had been taken toward carrying out his administration's two prime objectives—a lower tax levy and cheaper water power.

### OLD NEWSPAPERS OWNED BY COOMLER

Mort Coomler, 172 West Myers street, is the owner of a copy of the New York Morning Post, dated Friday, Nov. 7, 1783. The newspaper is of four pages, of four columns each, with paid advertising taking up most of the space.

The masthead shows that it was published every Tuesday and Friday by Morton and Horner, No. 7 Water street, "between the Coffee House and Old Slip."

Several of the advertisements are military orders, issued from headquarters and signed by Col. De Lancy, adjutant general representing the commander-in-chief. One of these prohibits the defacing of destruction of any stone or brick building until the "board of commissioners for settling and adjusting matters of account, debt, &c., gives its permission. Also here is a proclamation from a British source warning against insult of the colors of any foreign nation in New York harbor.

### YANKS LOSE TO SENATORS, 4-3

New York, Aug. 14 (AP)—The American league pennant race crystallized into a situation today where the chief concern of the Washington Senators seemed to be which National league club would meet them in the world series.

As the Senators and New York Yankees headed into the west, Washington with six straight victories enjoyed a five and a half game lead over the Yanks and showed no signs of slumping, while the New Yorkers were playing uncertain baseball with seven defeats in 11 starts.

The Senators made it 12 wins in 19 meetings with the Yanks, this season by beating them, 4 to 3. They got 12 hits off Russell Van Atta and scored four runs in the third, fourth, and fifth frames.

A first inning parade of 11 runs at the expense of Cain, Coombs and Oliver, enabled Boston to trounce the Philadelphia A's, 19 to 10. Cleveland gained on the Athletics by taking both ends of a doubleheader from St. Louis, 5 to 3, and 3 to 2.

Detroit shaded Chicago, 6 to 5. In the National league, the third place Chicago Cubs gained ground by beating second place Pittsburgh, 3 to 2, while the leading New York Giants bowed to Philadelphia, 2 to 1. The Giants were left three and a half games ahead of Pittsburgh and four ahead of the Cubs.
