

JUNIOR CHAMPS HONORED WITH PUBLIC DINNER

Woodburn—The Woodburn Junior Legion ball team, state champions, was honored with a dinner by the chamber of commerce at the Woodburn hotel Tuesday night, which was attended by a large number of people, including many of the players' parents.

Following the dinner, John Ramo, president of the chamber of commerce, called upon Harold M. Austin, chairman of the baseball committee, who acted as master of ceremonies. Austin expressed his joy in being able to accompany the team to Pocatello. A speech, written by one of the boys, whose name was not made public, was read by Mrs. Ray Glatt, in which the writer expressed the appreciation of the team for the support given by the home town. Austin expressed appreciation of the wholehearted support not only of Woodburn but of the surrounding communities, the parents of the boys, the newspapers and the state committee, which furnished \$800 towards the expenses of going to Idaho.

Roy "Spec" Keene, head of Junior Legion baseball in Oregon, told of his experience with the team and expressed his confidence in the Woodburn boys. He also gave a brief statement of the schedule of games, which will be from Pocatello to Topeka, Kansas, and then the finals at New Orleans.

Each member of the team was introduced and given hearty applause and the parents present were also requested to stand and were given a hearty cheer.

Austin gave a farewell talk of advice to the boys and also announced that the official departure of the team would be made from Hubbard Wednesday night at 8 o'clock and requested all Woodburn citizens to drive to Hubbard for a farewell program from 7 to 8 o'clock, which will be in charge of Mayor Voygt. This has been arranged in recognition of the large number of boys from Hubbard on the team. Austin also stated that if the team comes on from Pocatello that more funds would be necessary.

C. school for the deaf, has been won by a Silverton boy as one of three who will go to the finishing institution from the Salem school. He is Herman Brekke, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Brekke of Oak street, and has been a student at the Salem school for six years. The family came to Silverton from Iowa.

Brekke became deaf as a result of an unusual accident before he was 6 years old. With a group of small children who were in their first year of school, he was standing near a curb near a school truck when an auto driver crashed into the group and struck down several Brekke was thought to have lost his eyesight for several months as he lay in a hospital, then the affection caused him to lose his hearing and his sight improved.

He attended the school for the deaf at Fairview, Minn., previous to the family moving to Oregon, and has been an honor student since then at the Salem institution. Just what line of practical remunerative work Brekke will follow, the Washington institute will be determined later. He will report there during September.
