Scio History Pages Are Turned Back As Old Notation Found

Scio—Pages of Scio history were turned back nearly half a century in the discovery of a lead pencil notation on the interior of the Odd Fellows hall in this city when the building was being repainted and renovated a few months ago.

"George L. Sutherland taught school in this building in 1884-85. This inscription, almost 50 years old, was as legible as when first placed there by the veteran of many years of school room discipline and work in training the young idea to shoot," by George L. Sutherland.

Sutherland was born and reared in the Scio region, and at the age of 25 years he was teaching school in this community. The present Odd Fellows hall here then stood on a site near the present residence of George Patry.

"The winter I taught in that building the attendance grew to about 60, ranging in ages from 6 to 25 years," Mr. Sutherland remarked in recalling the educational conditions obtaining here 50 years ago. "It was the custom in those days for one teacher to handle all who came to the school, often necessitating 20 to 30 classes a day."

"I taught in that building during the winter months the school building was congested, as young people had nothing else to do but go to school, Sutherland recalled. "It kept us both busy most of the time until spring broke. Attendance began to fall off, and I suggested to the school board that one teacher could handle the situation and save some tax money."

Accordingly, the services of Mr. Richardson were discontinued and I completed the school year."

A lot of interesting history clusters around the old building in Scio. Many of the pioneers of the region attended school there and to this day they recall with pleasant memories the days of the early '80s in a country hamlet that aspired to become a future county seat—an ambition that has never been gratified.
