

SIXTEEN GIRLS DEVOTE CAREER GOD'S SERVICE

Mt. Angel—At an impressive ceremony held in the chapel of Mount Angel, sixteen young women consecrated themselves to the service of God. In the presence of His Excellency, Edward D. Howard, Archbishop of Portland, who assisted mass in mitre and crozier, solemn high mass was sung by Rev. Father Cyril, O. S. B., of St. Benedict's Abbey, Rev. Father James Koesler, O. S. B., and Rev. Father Urban, O. S. B., as deacon and sub-deacon; Rev. Father Vincent Thomas, O. S. B., as assistant to the Archbishop; Rev. Father Danian, O. S. B., and Rev. Father Robert, O. S. B., as masters of ceremonies.

The choir sang the three-part mass of St. Cecilia, by Cherubini, an offertory, "Veni Sponsa Christi," by Rev. Father Placidus, O. S. B., of Portland, who also presided at the organ.

His Excellency, Archbishop Howard, D. D., delivered a most impressive sermon, taking for his theme, "Union with God, the Essence of Religion."
