

WATER SYSTEM MAIN SUBJECT AT MONMOUTH

Monmouth—The best way of conserving the city water system and taking advantage of the prospect for RFO money was thoroughly talked over by a meeting of city officials with interested citizens in the Legion hall at their last meeting. Mayor Bowerson had a section of wood pipe taken up at the intake which showed rotten places and explained the situation.

He said the city has now paid off the debt of \$25,000 contracted 20 years ago when the reservoir and distributing system were installed. There is yet outstanding on the water system the \$60,000 cost of the gravity water system installed in 1919. The mayor stated that the life of the wood pipe in the distributing system was guaranteed at 20 years and while this pipe has given little or no trouble, he thought it about time that serious difficulties may be encountered with it.

If we fail now, he stated, to take advantage of the present change to get the government donation of 30 per cent and the interest charge of four per cent, the situation might arise where the system would have to be replaced about the time the gravity line gave out and the combination would find us unable to get the money to make replacement.

The idea was expressed by citizens present that more water was the most urgent need, especially for the dry months of summer. Conditions at the intake were talked over and the possibility of a new arrangement to get a larger flow of water. Since the city has taken advantage of its bonded indebtedness privileges a special election would have to be called. The mayor thought the present offer from the RFO expires January first and he thought action should be taken shortly.

A representative of a wood pipe, treated with creosote, was present and made a number of claims for the product. He claimed from pipe constantly lessens in capacity to carry water owing to the filling of the pipe with rust. He said creosote treated wood will last indefinitely and can be subjected to alternate periods of wet and dry without its usefulness being impaired. He claimed for his pipe that no sap wood is included in its construction and asserted the pipe on exhibition showed decay due to sap wood being included in its construction.

The meeting finally adjourned, determined to take up a section of pipe now in use in the distributing system and note its condition.
