

HARVEST HOME PICNIC SLATED FOR SILVERTON

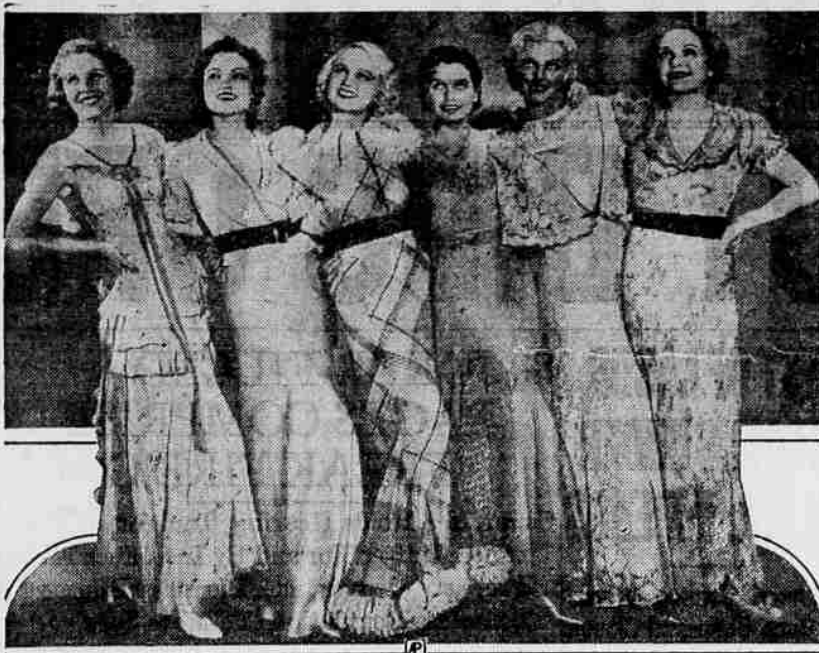
Silverton—Precursors of the Roosevelt harvest home picnic were in town Tuesday making definite arrangements for the biggest event of the summer for the Silverton municipal park to be held Sunday.

Among the prominent speakers on the day's program will be W. A. Delsell, August Hucksenstein, Thomas Cole, Dr. Floyd Utter, Kenneth Bayne, Henry Crow, P. L. Frazer, B. S. Martin, Dr. Henry Morris, A. M. Dalrymple and John Marshall. The Marion county Democratic headquarters are in active charge of the affair and readily anticipate well over three thousand in attendance. Reservations of all the tables in the park were made Tuesday and plans for the heating of water for the free coffee were completed. Adjoining counties are sending representatives. National, state and Marion county men will explain and discuss the outlines of the public works program, the National Industrial Recovery Act, the forest reserve plans and numerous other special topics that concern the American people at the present time.

Among the afternoon sports, swimming in the Silver creek pool will be popular. The pool has recently undergone a thorough cleaning and is large enough to accommodate a crowd of any size. Special police help has been promised to aid in parking cars.

One of the best social features of the day will be the basket dinner at noon.
