

JOHNSON STILL STEALING CARS OFFICERS FIND

Woodburn—Paul Johnson, state training school boy on parole who last December stole an automobile belonging to Mrs. Maudie Richards, is again leading the officers a merry chase as he continues his chosen occupation.

Johnson was paroled by the training school a few months ago and at that time was brought to the Richards home by an official from the school and promised to go straight if given a chance. Hoping to help the boy to reform, the charge of theft for which a warrant had been issued, was held in abeyance pending his good behavior. He was placed with a family at Redmond.

It is reported that he recently left Redmond with a stolen car and arriving in Portland took a second car, which he wrecked near Klamath Falls. Then he nonchalantly called for the wrecker to take care of the wrecked machine and while this was being done a crowd had stopped to watch the operation he appropriated a car by taking it out of the wreckers and continued on his way. At last reports he was still going.

After the theft of the Richards car, which was recovered by state police at Roseburg, Johnson was again placed in the training school and received no punishment except to be promoted to the position of chauffeur for training school officials. The warrant which had been issued was not allowed to be served while he was an inmate of the school.

Albany—Steps were taken to enable wheat growers of Linn county to take advantage of the agricultural adjustment plan at a meeting of the county committee held Wednesday night. Members of the committee are Charles Pugh, Sheld; Gordon Pike, Plainview; Floyd Jenks, Tangent; B. B. Doughton, Lebanon; Chris Paik, Halsey; George Sandner, Selo; A. L. Owens, Harrisburg; Robert Marsh, from north of Albany; James Johnson, Jefferson, representing the county Farmers' union, and A. L. Carnegie, Albany, representing the granges of the county. George Blinckhorn, Smith-Hughes teacher at Lebanon, and Floyd Mullen county horticultural inspector acted as advisors to the committee.

C. R. Briggs of Corvallis, emergency agent, gave an explanation of the world wheat situation and its effect on wheat prices. The committee then voted to form the necessary organization and as a preliminary step the county was divided into six districts: Halsey, Harrisburg, Brownsville-Sweet Home, Lebanon-Loomis, East Albany, West Albany, and Selo-Rock Creek.

At least one meeting will be held in each of the districts between now and the first week in September in order to acquaint the farmers with the terms of the act and the situation of the wheat growers.

Woodburn Cannery Starts Operations
Woodburn—The Ray-Brown cannery at Woodburn started Wednesday of this week on blackberries and is expected to begin on pears by the first of September. A heavy rain is expected during the pear season. The matter of disposing of pear peellings, which has caused considerable trouble in the past, has been solved by the preparation of a series of dumping grounds south of the warehouse. Each of these spaces is about the size of an acre with banks of dirt erected on all sides. A pipe line from the cannery will carry the refuse to this place, where it will be poured on the ground in rotation, being allowed to soak into the ground and dry in each plot before it is used again.
