HOPS START EAST; COOLING IS USED

Independence—One hundred and twenty-seven bales of Oregon hops were trucked out over the rails of the Southern Pacific line from Independence Monday, bound for New York city. R. K. Montgomery, local agent, stated that the shipments were beginning to show some movement now, and a second car, refrigerator type, packed heavily with ice, was prepared and started on its way to Chicago Wednesday morning. Montgomery stated that the ice shipment was not the usual procedure but that in periods of excessive heat the method was used to assure a good condition of the cargo upon its arrival. The car contained 70 bales.

Transients are unusually numerous this time of the year, according to Mr. Montgomery, and a constant tide of these men are coming and going, many stopping near the buildings and empty box cars in the yard for several days at a time. The hum of the big saws has begun at Valsec with great zeal and between 10 and 12 cars of dressed material per day have been arriving here on alternate days of the week. Nine cars came in yesterday morning.

THRESHER CREW FINISH HARVEST

Waldo Hills—The threshing crew of the Fabery company will complete about half the run of spring grain this week. Only minimum amount of fall grain lived through the freeze of last winter which lessened the usual high yield of the community. Much of the spring grain was rescued, however, the yield is above the average of other communities. The King threshing outfit completed its work in the Evergreen district Monday evening and are now in the Union Hill community for ten days.

Monmouth—The harvesting of spring grain in this section is about complete and the small crop of winter grain which withstood the winter freeze and other late rains are well under way. The yield of spring grain is above average and is considered the best crop here for many years. The winter grain is also yielding a fair percentage. Rye grasses, clover seed and vetch are crops which are late winter. A light yield of walnuts is reported while filberts are plentiful and indicate a good harvest.

Valley View—The Lorraine and Cornett threshing machine will complete work in this community this week with the spring grain yielding well and the fall grain that survived the winter freeze showing up an excellent production.

Brush Creek—The Benson combine threshing machine, operated by Clayton Benson and Olaf Hillard, have completed two weeks' work in this community. Herman Kuensli's Mathys, Andrew Haere and William Maurer farms during the week. Production indications for wheat in the Brush Creek district are fair; oats are reported as excellent in yield and quality; hay, very good. Hops are said to be very fine; prunes good.

Evans Valley—Judging by reports from two farmers of this community, the yield of grain is fine. Fred Haaklebach's oat average per acre was 60 bushels, and Perry Saunders' wheat made 41 bushels to the acre.

Silverton—The Horden threshing outfit from the Thomas district will complete work in the Albion community this week. The grain is turning out above average.

HARVEST OF HOP CROP UNDER WAY THRU DISTRICT

Independence—Harvesting of early hops is now in full way in the Independence area. In some of the yards the work was started Monday, but it was not until Wednesday that the activity assumed sizeable proportion and it was started yesterday and others will work today.

Reports indicated that the work is progressing satisfactorily. There is plenty of help—more than can be used—but this is a condition which develops every year during the picking of early hops. Probably 75 per cent of the hops grown here are of the late cluster variety and usually these are not ripe enough to pick until the first Monday in September. Weather conditions create some slight variations in hop maturity, and it is possible that the hot days of the past week may hasten by a few days the late hop harvest. In fact, some growers are now changing their plans to some extent.

The harvesting of early hops has not advanced to the stage where there is anything definite about the yield. It is generally believed that it will be better than last year, but as one grower has pointed out this estimate may be based on foliage rather than hops, although it is his opinion that the return will be average, at least.

While most of the hops are being picked on a weight basis, hops which have been solidly formed, just normally filled boxes showing a weight of 45 to 50 pounds, while around 42 pounds is generally accepted box.

Yards where picking is in progress include the Altvall, Wright, E. E. Turner, Y. M. DeCoster, D. P. McCarthy, Pomeroy and Mattison, G. E. Newton, S. J. Hoover, Lloyd Gunnicut, Dean Walker's young ranch, Seavey-Walker's, Titus and Cooper ranches, Pankalla's, K. L. Williams.

The Collins' yard started Friday; C. A. Yergen will begin today and others have either started or are about to begin. Hoover is trucking his hops from his new place in the Hopville sector, to his new drying plant just north of town.

UNEMPLOYED ASK FOR RANCH EMPLOYMENT

Independence—Pulling into town as hitch-hikers, aboard box-cars and in rattling family cars, 1784 people have registered their names with the local U. S. employment bureau during the last ten days. This number does not include the vast number of people coming here seeking employment in the hop yards that were previously registered and it was announced Wednesday from the employment office that reports from the ranches tell of many who regard registration as a futile process and make their way directly to the hop yards in an effort to find work. Mornings find the prospective workers lined up outside the buildings on Main street waiting to file their names at the office, and a constant stream passes in and out all day making inquiries about opening dates in outlying hop yards.

Pickers were told this week that it would be impossible to find employment in the yards during the picking of hops since all yards were jammed to capacity. A number of ranches have taken on more pickers than necessary in order to give employment to needy families camped about the city. Some families have loaded their belongings in the cars again, preparatory to leaving, believing it would be impossible to get any work during the season, while others have temporarily set up camp, awaiting developments when the picking of the late hops starts.

J. E. Cooter, manager of the local office, spoke to an assembly of campers at a camp fire meeting August 17, stressing need for following some method of sanitation in the disposal of waste. The response to this plea was the building of temporary toilets across the river where the majority of the campers outside of the ranches are living and the grounds are being efficiently cared for. Several sacks of string beans obtained from the Stayton cannery by Cooter this week were taken to the grounds across the river and distributed among the families.

INDEPENDENCE ALL READY FOR SEASON

Independence—In the interest of Independence' law and order during this "boom" stage of the year, two men have been added to the staff of the local police. George Thompson, state officer from Salem, is on general duty in this district, covering the town and hop yards on both sides of the river. Prutus Ashcroft, local man, has been deputized for night duty during the hop season and will work a shift of patrol duty from 8 p. m. to 6 a. m. Ashcroft began work on Monday and Thompson took over his local patrol on Wednesday. Chief of Police Oscar Moore stated yesterday that the town has been quiet and to date no outbreaks had been reported within the city.
