

GYPSY CARAVAN VISITS TURNER AND TAKES CASH

Turner—A gypsy band comprising about a dozen swarthy members riding in three cars descended on Turner for another of their irregular visits Monday morning and before they had left had picked the pockets of Curt Mellis and started a hubbub of excitement with the dashing here and there of cars of indignant citizens, a call for the state police and their final capture at Jefferson and Aumville.

After making the rounds of most of the stores in Turner and receiving but scant attention to their pleas of fortune telling, they encountered Mellis near the Barber grocery. Entirely unknown to Mellis one of the gypsy women succeeded in picking his pocket and immediately jumped into one of the cars. At that moment Mellis discovered his loss and he and Lee Barber took immediate pursuit. They overhauled one of the cars in Aumville but not the right one. The other car was stopped in Jefferson and the occupants were brought before Turner by the Jefferson marshal.

By this time the state police were on hand and in the ensuing get-together the gypsies denied in all respects getting any money or even being in Turner, however after some parley they turned over \$7 to Mellis, the amount taken. Mellis stated later they requested a receipt from him which he gave reluctantly, saying they had failed to give him a receipt when they extracted his money. The band was allowed to go their way after being admonished not to come back.

BETHANY HOP HOUSE IS RAZED BY BLAZE

Silverton—The first destructive fire for the Silverton community since June occurred late Saturday afternoon on the hop ranch operated by Mrs. Wolfe near the Bethany school, when one of the hop houses was burned to the ground. Origin of the blaze cannot be accounted for, but it had been in the building for drying purposes this year. Picking of hops had not begun. The warehouse and other nearby buildings were saved by the efficient work of the Silverton fire department that responded to the call and were able to use water from the creek which is near.

MONMOUTH HAS WATER TROUBLE

Monmouth—Investigation of the wood pipe in the city distributing system has disclosed the pipe is still in good condition. Such weakness as exists in the pipe at the present time is mostly in the collars, or joints. In most of the joints some water has constantly leaked out and this has had a tendency to enlarge through grooves worn by the dripping water.

Mayor Hoseney says it would be as expensive to dig down to the collars and replace them as to dig up and renew the whole system. He asserts the pipe is not of even lengths and all of the pipe would have to be uncovered to find the joints. The city has figures on the cost of renewing the wood pipe and laying it, but has as yet no estimate for iron pipe.

Friday the water committee plans to go to the Teal creek intake and investigate the upper reaches of the pipe.

With dry northeast winds, supplemented by days of smoke and haze from the forest fires raging not so very far away, the city has suffered a water shortage. Starting with water run off in fire practice, followed by a series of breaks in the pipe line near the intake the city has had a scarcity of water, and places in the city where the elevation is above the average, water was not to be had. This condition has served to spur activity in planning improvements.

ROWELL FINDS MEANS TO END FIRE HAZARD

Dallas—One way to eliminate the fire hazard of some empty lots overgrown with weeds near his home has been solved this summer by L. H. Rowell, who lives on East Howe street. Rowell's children took a liking to tennis in common with a number of other boys and girls who reside in that neighborhood so he proceeded to convert the vacant lots, the owner of them never having been near them for 13 years, into two tennis courts. Here there is ample opportunity for the youngsters to enjoy themselves and while the courts are not first class hard surfaced ones, they fill a want which could only be filled by a long walk to some other court with the possible disappointment of not being allowed to play on arrival.

Portable Cannery Operating, Turner

Turner—The Marion county relief portable cannery arrived at Turner Saturday morning and is stationed on the Davis estate near the old rock quarry southeast of town. Large quantities of green beans are being brought in for canning, and families without vegetable canning facilities are being supplied on the shares for the winter use. The cannery is here for a four day run going on to Stayton. Families from the Marion, Aumville, Shaw and Turner communities have been busy hauling beans for the relief cannery, and a generous response has been made in this district for the relief work. Postmaster J. E. Whitehead is the new Red Cross chairman assisting with the charitable activity.

Mill City Lumber Hours Are Fixed

Mill City—The employees in the Hammond Lumber company office are now working on a new basis of 40 hours a week, between 8:45 and 5 o'clock for five days, and from 8:45 to 12:30 o'clock Saturday. The 40 hour week is being run on Mondays a week with two shifts. The shingle and saw mills are operating 40 hours a week with a minimum wage of 42 1/2 cents.

THRESHER ENDS SEASON

WATER SYSTEM BOND PAYMENTS ARE OVER

Monmouth—This week Recorder Tachon issued a warrant making the last payment of \$25,000 indebtedness, the cost of the original water system. This bond issue was sold 21 years ago. But very little was paid on this obligation until after the gravity water system was put in operation in 1919. Even then much of the income of the system was diverted to development work both in the city and on the pipe line.

In the earlier days of the system it was the custom to divert money from the water fund to general fund use. Only in recent years has the necessity of laying aside funds to meet the overhanging obligation been seriously stressed.

The special fund of 50 cents per patron per month, has since it was instituted two years ago, yielded \$4,000 for bond retirement purposes.
