

PARKER'S, VETS WIN 1ST ROUND KITBALL TILT

Parker's team of Salem and the Veterans of Foreign Wars club of Oregon City will meet Wednesday night at Sweetland field in the final game of the series to determine the kitball champions of the state. Playing in the semi-finals Monday night, Parker's had little difficulty in stopping the Knights of Columbus of Eugene, 9 to 1, while the veterans nosed out the strong B. P. Johns aggregation of Portland 6 to 5 in a 12 inning thriller. Wednesday night's encounter promises to be a real contest with the veterans apparently having an edge in form.

Parker's started their scoring early when Keber smacked one into the mill race in the initial inning. He repeated the performance in the fifth while John Oravee poled a homer in the ninth. Not until the game was nearly over did the Eugeneans dent the home plate. The Canseys used two pitchers in an attempt to stop Parker's hitting.

Johns held the lead from the first inning until the ninth when the Veterans drove in the tying score. Both teams scored in the first inning. LAVELLE LEAVING FOR NORTH DAKOTA

Les LaVelle, for the past two years athletic coach at the Salem Indian school, will leave by automobile Wednesday morning for Turtle Mountain, N. D., where he will engage in a similar line of work with the government Indian school. LaVelle's family, which recently went to Los Angeles, will remain in the south for the time being.

Prior to coming to Chemawa, LaVelle coached at Riverside junior college near Los Angeles. He is a graduate of the University of Southern California. With the change in policy on the part of the government in connection with the Indian schools, LaVelle was given a furlough from the local institution. After returning to Los Angeles, however, he was notified to report to Turtle Mountain. LaVelle knows little about the Turtle Mountain institution and has no idea of what the set up there will be.

SEEK BAN ON DUCK BAITING COMING YEAR

Washington, Aug. 29 (UP)—Regulations for the 1933-34 water fowl hunting season, designed to prohibit baiting of ducks, led to heated dispute at hearings here today.

Proponents held that baiting tended to foster wholesale killing and decimate flocks. The birds would concentrate around large baiting areas, causing unequal distribution throughout the country, it was argued.

Others contended ducks would starve if left to feed from natural sources and eventually migrate permanently to Mexico where they would be killed wholesale.

On a requirement that ducks to be shot at a distance of at least 100 yards it was stated this would insure the sporting character of duck hunting. However, it was also held this would cause more ducks to be injured than killed.

Thomas Beck, game commissioner of Connecticut, led the opposition charging the ruling was "insane." He was supported by Nathan Moran, California conservationist who sarcastically suggested duck hunters' pictures should go in the "rogues' gallery." Soon, he added, "They will be making us wear red hats; use no

blinds and ask the duck's permission to shoot him." Ling Darling, Iowa cartoonist, and Dr. William Hornaday of New York, led arguments for the regulations. Darling vigorously objected to assertions that those in favor of the regulations were "sentimentalists and knew nothing about duck hunting."

"I'm a duck hunter," he said, "and a damn good one too."
