BEER ORDINANCE GIVEN APPROVAL

Dallas—An adjourned meeting of the city council Monday night saw the first reading of an ordinance repealing the present beverage license ordinance successfully make the grade and win the approval of the councilmen present.

The new ordinance provides for a stamp tax in addition to the existing license fees. The measure calls for a one dollar tax on a thirty one gallon barrel, fifty five cents on a fifteen gallon barrel, thirty cents on an eight gallon container, twenty cents on a five gallon one, one cent on a quart and half-a-cent on a pint.

The regular licenses in effect meantime are for restaurants, \$12.50 for six months and for other retailers, \$5 for six months.

Another change makes all licenses expire either on the thirtieth day of June or the thirty first day of December. The system in vogue meantime calls for the expiration of the permit six months from the date of issue.

The proposed ordinance will come up for its final passage next Monday.
