Philharmonic Choir To Present Concert

Returning from a triumphant tour of the west, the Philharmonic choir of the University of Oregon will appear in concert at the First Methodist church Friday night, September 1. Appointed as official representative from the state of Oregon, the choir has been on tour for the past ten weeks and from the Chicago Century of Progress exposition.

Concerts have been given in practically all of the leading cities west of the Mississippi including Pendleton, Boise, Idaho, Boulder, Colo., Lincoln, Kans., Moberly, Mo., Chicago, and others. Packed auditoriums have greeted the choir at nearly every appearance, with a combined total of over 75,000 people having heard them outside of numerous radio audiences.

One of the most signal honors that came to the choir was the presentation of them by the National Broadcasting company over a nationwide network. Other radio appearances included stations WVA, WENR, KWW, KSL and KTFI.

Arrangements are being made for extra seats in the First Methodist church to care for the large crowd which is expected for the "Welcome Home" program. The same program as given on the 6000 mile tour will be presented. No admission charge will be made, a free-will offering will be taken to go towards taking care of expenses incurred on the trip.

STATE KITBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME TONIGHT

Oregon City is expected to send a large number of fans to tonight's game.

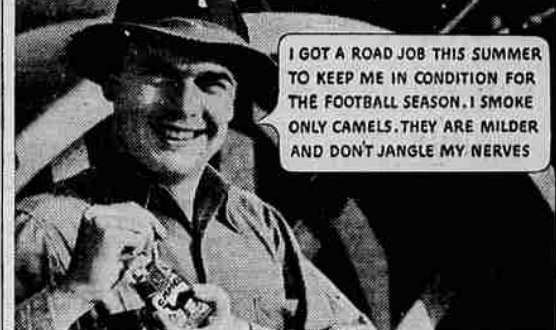
Chaplain Kelley charged: "They completely disregarded the commission's edict against rowdiness and clowning and the suspension is going to stick."
