

ANGELS DRIVE TOWARD TITLE BEATING SEALS

Los Angeles drove forward today towards the 1933 Coast league championship with a full four-game advantage over the second-place Hollywood club.

The Angels took the measure of the Seals 5-4, while another San Francisco team, the Missions, downed the Stars 9-5 with a 17-hit attack. Fay Thomas held the Seals to one run until the ninth when Leo Osenberg homered with two men on base to tie the count at 4-all. Thomas won his own game in the Los Angeles half of the ninth when he singled to score Gene Lillard. Lillard cracked out his 35th four-bagger of the season in the fourth.

The Hollywood-Missions clash saw three star hurlers take turns at trying to stop the free-hitting Reds. Only Pitcher Lloyd Johnson failed to hit safely for the Missions. Despite the Mission walloping of Campbell, Buchanan and Miljus, the Stars' second baseman, Fred Haney, captured the day's batting honors with four singles in four trips to the plate.

Portland pulled up to within a game of Hollywood by trouncing Oakland 17-9. Eight Oakland errors and 17 safeties off Salinas, McEvoy, Fieber and Gabler combined to give the Beavers their high run total. Portland's Rookie outfielder, Loans, topped the slugger with a home run and pair of singles that drove in five Beaver runs. Hal Turpin and Jack Wilson hurried for the winners.

Second Baseman Alex Kampouris of Sacramento knocked the ball out of Seattle's park twice last night to send home four runs as the Senators noosed out the Indians 6-5. Ed Bryan was touched for three hits and four runs in the sixth inning but aside from that kept the Indians in check.

Oregon State College, Corvallis, Sept. 13.—Although Oregon State lost 12 football lettermen through the graduation or three year rule, 18 more are expected to answer roll call here for the opening of Pacific coast conference football practice Saturday morning. Even though Lon Stiner, Orange coach, has lost little sleep over his prospects, nevertheless he will have a hard time forgetting Hal Moe, great blocking right half; Curly Miller, tackle, and Keith Davis, stellar punter.

Returning lettermen, several outstanding reserves and three or four talented sophomores are expected to make up for the losses. The Orange mentor got a good line on most of his men in spring practice and has a fair idea of what his first string will look like in the opening games of the season—a double header with Willamette university and Southern Oregon Normal school here September 23.

The Orangemen will open their conference schedule here September 30 against University of Montana. Oregon State will play Gonzaga in Portland October 7, San Francisco university in San Francisco October 14, Southern California in Portland October 21, Washington State here in the homecoming game October 28, Oregon in Portland November 11, and Fordham university in New York November 18.

MANY REGULARS AVAILABLE FOR OREGON TEAM

Eugene, Sept. 13 (UP)—There will be few new faces in the Oregon lineup this year, and in light of last year's record, "Prink" Callison's prospects do not seem too bright.

His severest losses from last year's team were Capt. Bill Morgan at tackle and Bill Bowerman, stalwart quarterback.

Ralph Terjeson, who saw some service last year, probably will succeed Bowerman, although the plays likely will be called by the veteran Mark Temple, halfback, and backfield captain.

Alex Eagle and Chuck Bishop will be fighting for Morgan's tackle berth. Both saw service last year when Morgan broke his hands.

Callison faces a tough situation in meeting the strong Gonzaga eleven September 30, just two weeks after practice starts, but will have a testing game against Linfield college of the northwest conference September 22. Oregon beat Gonzaga 13 to 6 last year but had a hard time doing it.

The Webfoots play a 10 game schedule, meeting in succession Linfield, Gonzaga, Columbia (Portland), Washington, Idaho, U. C. L. A., Utah, Oregon State, Southern California and St. Mary's. The sophomores coming up from last year's freshman team give little encouragement to Callison, who succeeded Doc Clarence Spears as head football coach last year, and he will have to depend largely on his 1932 men.

Plenty of lettermen are available for all positions and the backfield

particularly, built around Temple and Big Mike Mikulak, should be improved in experience.

The line will pivot around the veteran Bernie Hughes, line captain, about as tough a defensive center as there is in the conference. Incidentally, Hughes is the last of Callison's championship Medford high school team which he coached before coming to Oregon as freshman coach.

ROSS CINCHES TITLE CLAIM

New York, Sept. 13 (AP)—The big town, the toughest in the world to convince, was ready today to admit Barney Ross of Chicago to the ranks of the world's ring champions.

Out of one of the most savage, grueling fights ever seen in a local ring, the Jewish battler from the middle west emerged with his second victory over the veteran Tony Canzoneri, from whom he won the lightweight title less than three months ago.

With 40,000 howling fans looking on at the Polo grounds last night, most of them pulling feverently for Canzoneri to turn the tables on the former amateur champion and reclaim his crown. Ross withstood Tony's early rushes, caught up with him midway of the fight and beat him all over the ring before it was over.

As in their first scrap at Chicago, it was so close it required the vote of the referee to reach a decision. Arthur Donovan, who was in there with them for the torrid 15 rounds, cast his ballot for Ross after the judges had split.

Harold Barnes, one of the arbiters, gave the Chicago boy nine rounds, Canzoneri two and called four even. The other judge, George Kelly, awarded Canzoneri eight and Ross seven. Donovan gave Ross eight, Canzoneri four and adjudged three even.

Canzoneri, who had been so confident of regaining his title that he bet several thousand dollars on himself, was the most downhearted young man in New York.
