WOMAN CLAMPS CHILD'S TONGUE

Sacramento, Calif., Sept. 13 (AP)—Clothes pins were used to clamp the tongue of Erwin Anderson, four years old, police officer as a disciplinary measure, and that the boy's foster-mother, Mrs. Eva Anderson, 30, was under arrest today charged with inhuman treatment.

Juvenile Officer Frank Gessner, acting on neighbors' complaints, went to the Anderson home Monday and found the boy, sobbing in pain, on the top of the Anderson garage.

Gessner said two clamp-type clothes pins had been attached to the child's tongue which was pulled from his mouth. The officer said his face and body were bruised.

The boy, with clothes pins on his tongue and his hands covered with a pair of pants, neighbors told Gessner, was placed on the sidewalk in front of his home so his playmates could see him. Gessner found the child, crying from pain.

Mrs. May Wortz of the state welfare department, ordered the boy and his six year old brother, who were adopted conditionally by the Andersons last November from the California children's home society of Oakland, taken from the couple's custody.

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FLIER INCINERATED HIGH POWER LINE

Sacramento, Sept. 13 (AP)—The airplane in which Dana D. Thompson left here at 6:30 o'clock last night for San Francisco was found today hanging on a high power electric line with Thompson's charred body in it at Belvoir, Solano county.

Thompson was instructor in the Summit flying school here, which is a branch of a San Francisco company.

Trainmen of the Sacramento Northern railway noticed the plane on the wires at 5:30 o'clock this morning and reported the accident.

Thompson's plane evidently hit the power line at 7:03 o'clock last night as trainmen reported that at that time lights in the vicinity of Millar went out.

Robbers Make Big Haul at Amery, Wis.

Amery, Wis., Sept. 13 (AP)—A masked robber quartet today held up C. M. Olson, assistant cashier of the Union State bank, and fled with \$48,000 worth of cash and negotiable securities. They were believed by Melvin Passolt, chief of the Minnesota crime bureau, to be the same band who robbed a railway express agency in St. Paul Monday.

The loot included between \$11,000 and \$12,000 in cash. The raiders hid in the bank last night and overpowered two employees when they reported for work this morning.

Summer Excursion Extended by Espee

Extension of sales dates and return limits on all classes of round-trip summer excursion tickets from Pacific coast points to middle western and eastern destinations has been announced by the Southern Pacific company.

Intended primarily to accommodate autumn travel to the Chicago fair, the revised schedule will permit use of the low fares for the additional period October 15 to 31, it was made known by Felix S. McGinnis, vice president in charge of system passenger traffic. The final return limit of season tickets, he said, will be November 15 instead of October 31.

The greatly reduced roundtrip fares, established at the start of the summer tourist season, will remain in effect for the extended excursion period, it was stated.

TECHNOCRATS READY TO SAVE UNITED STATES

New York, Sept. 13 (AP)—Technocracy, the social engineering program designed by Howard Scott to save North America, is reaching its mechanized "life lines today in two branches over America.

Chief Technocrat Scott sits in a tall Manhattan office building and smiles at the "Roosevelt folly." "By October of next year the present revival expedient will have failed," says Scott. "I hope technocracy will be ready by then to take over the economic direction of the country."

And in a not far distant office building sits Harold Loeb, good friend of Scott, who is the executive officer of the continental committee on technocracy.

The organizations are independent of each other and each claims more than 200,000 members in North America, principally in the midwest and along the west coast.

Loeb also is sure the Roosevelt NRA program will fail soon unless there is an inflation which will only "postpone the day of failure."

Back of both organizations is the idea that the United States must be prepared for the coming power of technocracy through educational channels.

About one year ago a wave of nationwide publicity swept over a small group of men working on technocracy at Columbia university. Bickering started. The group split.

Today the Howard Scott group and the continental committee work along the same lines.

Technocracy explains continental, is "a scientifically planned system of production and distribution in which the purchasing power will equal consumption needed, limited only by production capacity."

"Technocracy is not a philosophy of despair," says Loeb, "but a state of despair with which among the people before they turn to technocracy for guidance."

RED CROSS CHAPTERS MEET ON TUESDAY

Representatives of Oregon chapters of the American Red Cross will hold a conference in Salem next Tuesday with a luncheon at the Marion hotel at noon in conjunction with the weekly meeting of the Kiwanis club, according to Justice George Roseman, of the state supreme court, chairman of the Willamette valley chapter.

James L. Fieser, of Washington, D. C., vice chairman of the American Red Cross, will speak at the conference. He is the second highest official in the organization, exceeded in authority only by Judge John Barton Bayne, national chairman.

Meetings of this nature are regional and are held once each year but this is the first time one has been held in Salem, Judge Roseman explains. The conference last year was in Medford. Executive secretary of chapters and others interested in the work and activities of the Red Cross attend to exchange ideas, help solve problems and outline the work for the year. Other speakers will be on the morning program with round table discussions scheduled for the afternoon.

GREEN GETS RESPIRE FROM THE GALLOWS

Sacramento, Cal., Sept. 13 (AP)—Jack D. Green, condemned Los Angeles murderer, was withdrawn from the shadow of the gallows for the fifth time today when Governor Rolph granted a reprieve from his sickbed in a San Francisco hospital.

The new date for execution was set for Friday, Nov. 17.

Because of Rolph's illness, the statement issued at the governor's office here said, he has been unable to give consideration to commutation pleas now before him in behalf of Green.

For this reason, the governor said, he was postponing the execution of Green so that he might go over carefully the voluminous record in the case.

Ailment Fatal To Sourdough's Wife

Los Angeles, Sept. 13 (AP)—An attack of acute indigestion resulted fatally yesterday for Mrs. A. A. Allen, wife of "Scotty" Allen, famed Alaska sourdough and mail carrier. She died at her home while her husband was in Berkeley, Cal., on a business trip. Allen is a prominent figure in the north country where he packs mail between Valdez and Nome. His expert driving has won him many prizes in dog races, a sport in which a daughter, Fay, is also quite adept.

RETAIL PRICES STATIONARY

Washington, Sept. 13 (AP)—The department of labor estimated today that retail prices of food showed an average increase of only three-tenths of one per cent for the two weeks ended August 29, compared with the preceding month.

In 49 cities, 28 showed increases as compared with 49 out of 51 cities embraced in the month before. While increases were more than seven per cent in some cities for the month ended August 15, the greatest increase for the two weeks' period was 2.5 per cent for Philadelphia and two per cent for Boston and Detroit.

Twenty-five of 42 commodities covered showed no change. Of the remaining 17, nine decreased and eight showed no change.

The largest increase was recorded in the price of eggs, which, however, rose only from 24.7 cents to 25.5 cents a dozen. Flour prices showed only a fractional increase, with the general average price of bread showing no change.

Lindy Unafraid of Swedish Army Plane

Stockholm, Sweden, Sept. 13 (AP)—Increased admiration for Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh was expressed by Swedish aviators today after he had tested a Swedish army plane in a variety of ways, including loops and spins.

The machine was one over which aviation circles have divergent opinions and the colonel's daring was admired all the more because of its challenged worth.

The plane in which Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh made a route survey over the North Atlantic before coming here was refueled for a 20-hour flight, leading to the belief they may leave shortly.

CYRIL DVORK FOUND DEAD IN ROOMING HOUSE

Cyril Dvork, about 65 years old, was found dead early today in his room over the WCTU hall at Commercial and Ferry streets. Whether death was due to natural causes or to suicide was to be determined after investigation later today.

The presence of a partially used chemical labeled strychnine indicated that the man may have taken his own life. It is known, however, that he was seriously ill with dropsy.

When found the body was seated in a chair near a window of his room. It was found by E. Bumaglin, another roomer, who informed Mrs. C. L. Slater, manager of the hall, who in turn informed the police, and Coroner L. E. Barick was called.

Practically all the information concerning Dvork came from Bumaglin. He said that Dvork was employed at the Marion county poor farm last fall, was injured there and had since been ill. His illness with dropsy is said to date back to January or February. He had roomed at the hall, it was said, since he left the employ of the county. The poor farm management was not certain of Dvork's identity, but believed he may have been a man who was employed about 10 days at the farm. He was not an inmate.

The chemical found in Dvork's room was sent to the Willamette university laboratory today. It found to be a poison an autopsy was to be ordered.

The body of J. E. Kennedy, found dead in Wilson park early Sunday with a gunshot wound in the head, was definitely identified yesterday afternoon by George B. Brockman, house man at the Treves hotel, Portland, where Kennedy had been registered August 25. Coroner Barick is attempting to locate acquaintances at Billings, Mont., from which city he registered, but so far, no word has come from there. The body will be held for a time.

ALLOTMENTS FOR WATER PROJECTS

Washington, Sept. 13 (AP)—Secretary Tamm today announced the allotment of \$25,537,825 for 19 non-federal projects, including \$11,700,000 to the Sacramento, California municipal district for a water system, and \$10,000,000 to Colorado for a highway.

Other allotments from the public works fund included \$17,000 for water works at the Merrill Water company, Oregon.

Common Colds Cured By Diet Of Vegetables Containing Carotene

Chicago, Sept. 13 (U.P.)—Common colds can be prevented by a diet containing fruits, vegetables and milk, Dr. A. F. O. Germann, Cleveland, Ohio, declared here today. Carotene, a food substance found in such a diet, builds a resistance which aids not only in preventing, but in throwing off colds, Dr. Germann, who is here attending the convention of the American Chemical society, asserted.

"Colds usually start in the respiratory system," he explained, "and carotene helps build resistance by strengthening the epithelial tissues which line the nose and throat."

Carotene also is believed to have a part in helping the blood to fight off infections which do gain entrance to the body, thus helping to cure colds.

A carotene supplement to a normal diet, he said, brings about improvement in vision in human cataracts; gives relief to hay fever; causes more rapid healing of wounds, and improves health generally.

"The food of prehistoric man," Dr. Germann continued, "consisted largely of green leaves, fruit and vegetables. Evidence of this is found in the fact that only through such a diet could he have secured the relatively large amounts of carotene necessary for maintaining the relative freedom from disease that many believe he enjoyed."

"Carotene is the yellow plant pigment found in green leaves, fruits and vegetables, and has been proven to be responsible for the vitamin A value of these foods."

"Even today the health of man apparently depends in large measure on the amount of this yellow pigment, carotene, he can succeed in storing in his body."

MANNY TALKS TO ROTARIANS

Conditions throughout the world are such that nothing can be done to stop socialism than could have prevented the adoption of the 18th amendment, Hank Manny of Seattle, former governor of district No. 2 of Rotary International, stated before the Rotary club at its weekly luncheon Wednesday.

"Service before self," the motto of the club, is a mere platitude and is not practiced by individual members in general, he said in emphasizing the need of the spirit of Rotary for application to international conditions. Nationalism is coming to the front with the development of the idea that individual nations are sufficient to themselves as evinced by the doctrine and leadership of men like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin. Because of its international spirit, Rotary is facing election from Germany at present and the situation existing in Europe portends another calamity such as the World war.

Responsibility of the American citizen rests first at home, with right thinking men taking an active interest in local conditions, starting first with the city, Manny declared. The government, local, state and nation, must stop wasting public funds.

"No NRA or any other force has sufficient power to bring back prosperity as desired unless this duty is willingly assumed," the speaker said. "The public debt of Oregon, Washington or Illinois can never be paid without confiscating property. Cut the expense of Oregon in two and you still can operate without a loss of service. Credit has been destroyed throughout the nation and if you can show how debts can be paid, credit and confidence will be restored."

REGISTRATION FOR PART TIME WORK STARTS

Registration for work in the part time continuation department of Salem high school, which gives every indication of exceeding the mark established last year, is being made in room 1-C of the senior building, according to announcement today by Violet T. Swanson, director. In view of the fact that many students expect to enroll and that accommodations are limited, Miss Swanson is urging registration for the course immediately. She will be in her room from 9:30 to 3:30 each day except Saturday and Sunday.

The program of the part time school is extremely flexible. Every effort is made to adjust the work to fit the particular needs of the individual pupil. This year the age limit of 18 years has been raised due to assistance of the federal government, thus opening the way to a larger group. The number to be admitted will be based, to a large extent upon the amount of room available and the sum to be appropriated by the government.

The purpose of the part time school is the continuation of the educational program of the adolescent who has found it necessary to withdraw temporarily from the full time school.

In most instances students who register for part time work have an objective in mind. Those in charge here are in a position to assist in every possible manner.

Credits are given which will enable students to complete their high school courses.

STATE HOSPITAL ENGINEER PASSES
