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Silverton Teacher To Report Monday

Silverton—Miss Helen Raltner of Astoria was hired by the Silverton school board Wednesday evening to fill a position in the junior high school which has been taught by Mrs. Harold Davis, junior high substitute, since the beginning of fall term. Miss Raltner will teach English and social science. She is a graduate of the University of Oregon and will begin her duties here Monday.

SCHOOL BUDGET DECREASE SEEN

Silverton—A budget was adopted by the members of the special budget committee and the members of the Silverton school board at a meeting Wednesday night in the council rooms of the Eugene Field building.

A reduction over last year's appropriation was well more than \$16,000, being \$75,031.21 against \$91,794.63 of last year. The cut falls largely on teachers' salaries as other items listed could not stand a further reduction. The present budget is \$26,699.29 under the 1930 budget, which called for \$101,930.50.

The lowest salary paid in the grades is \$792.48, or \$66.04 per month. In the junior high school, the teacher's salary on the lowest basis is \$77.00 per month. The salary is the same, \$77.00, in the senior high school. The highest salaries paid are superintendent's salary of \$2,700; senior high school principal, \$1700, and junior high principal, \$1450. The highest teacher's salary paid is \$217.12. The \$2,700 paid the superintendent includes the principalship of the Eugene Field grades and the clerkship of the Silverton school district.

The salary of the school librarian was reduced 16 per cent.

The \$16,000 reduction is due principally to smaller salaries, less number of teachers hired and the elimination of bus transportation in Marion county.

The budget hearing will be Thursday, October 26, in the Eugene Field building.
