

BULLDOG AND BEAVER GAME RATED TOSS UP

Oregon State College, Corvallis, Oct. 6.—With pre-game dope rating the two teams about a par, Oregon State and Gonzaga are ready for their contest on Multnomah field in Portland Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. This is a non-conference game.

Coach Stiner plans to mix a crushing power attack with a wide open passing game against the Bulldogs, while Mike Pecarovich, Gonzaga mentor, is expected to resort to passes to bring his scores. Gonzaga has a highly touted pass offense with Ike Peterson on the passing end of most of the aerial plays. The Orangemen have displayed a fair short passing attack in early season games but are expected to open up with longer throws Saturday.

Harry Field, right tackle, has been appointed captain for the game by Coach Stiner. Field, who hails from Hawaii, is a one year letterman and is the heaviest man on the first string, tipping the scales at 227 pounds.

BIG 10 OFFICIALS HEAR BEVAN CASE

Minneapolis, Oct. 6 (AP)—A University of Minnesota representative was enroute to Columbus, Ohio, today to present the William Bevan eligibility case to a Big Ten committee.

E. B. Pierce, member of the university senate committee on athletics, planned to consult Professor Thomas French of Ohio State university, chairman of the conference committee.

Bevan, expected by coaches to be a regular Gopher guard this season, received a failing mark in a course in 1932 while a student at the University of Oregon.

He said he was told successful completion of another course would remove this mark, and he came to Minnesota last fall believing he would be eligible for Big Ten play this season. Yesterday, however, Minnesota officials were advised a second time by the University of Oregon that the failure stood against Bevan, which would make him ineligible here this season.

Coast Teams Throw Off Wraps; Saturday Tilts Will Reveal Strength

San Francisco, Oct. 6 (UP)—The wraps will be off tomorrow at Los Angeles, Berkeley and Palo Alto. Football fans will get their first real estimates of what the "big" teams are likely to do this season. At Los Angeles the Southern California Trojans meet their first test against Washington State college, a powerful set of tough veterans from the Palouse country who have not, themselves, been tested.

St. Mary's will show the heavy line and speedy backfield that supporters believe will take them to a national championship. They will play University of California at Berkeley.

Santa Clara will go against Stanford at Palo Alto determined to show that the victory over California was no fluke. The Cardinals however, are favored by many on the basis of potential strength shown when they defeated University of California at Los Angeles, 3 to 0.

Those are the three big games of Saturday. The Trojans were favored to beat the Cougars. Bet here gave St. Mary's a 10-7 advantage over Berkeley.

Two years ago the Silverton "B" team held the Aumsville gridsters to a 6 to 6 tie, but last year, Aumsville trampled the home team seconds, 27 to 0. The "B" team this year looks far above such a drubbing, and a fine battle ensued.

Specht was the outstanding player with Larry making some good catches of passes.

Pettyjohn and Anderson officiated. The Silverton regulars will be idle this week but will clash with Molalla the following Friday, October 13, in a conference game, the first of the season. A practice game was played last week with Forest Grove resulting with a loss to Silverton of 7 to 0.

BACKFIRES HELD DISASTER CAUSE

Los Angeles, Oct. 6 (AP)—The board of park commissioners, conducting a hearing into the Griffith Park Holocaust of Tuesday afternoon, were told by witnesses that backfires started in an attempt to stop a major blaze probably caused the death of 27 or more men.

Testimony at the hearing developed that two or more backfires were started in the dry brush by the amateur fire fighters, who were unable to control them after they were lit.

The park commissioners, after listening to the testimony, ordered the withdrawal of all workers from Griffith park until adequate fire safeguards can be provided.

Of the dead, only 14 had been identified today. The identification was made through rings, teeth and x-ray photographs of bodies. A total of 76 names are still on the missing list.

The identified dead are: John A. Benson, 65; Walter Lee Bernor, 47; James Sweeney; Henry Taylor, 35.

John R. Dargo; Louis Kronheimer; Herman O. Burnett; Isaac Grayson; Harold Mahn, 25; Fernando Valenzuela; Robert R. Miles; Austin Williams; John C. Viorato and Roy Brown.
