

TORCH PARADE BRIGHT EVENT AT SILVERTON

Silverton—There were not streets enough in the town to hold the torch parade for the long line in the NRA torch demonstration at the fall opening event instigated by the Ad club, and sponsored by the business houses and surrounding industries of the town. The weather was ideal and the crowd was one of the largest ever to gather here.

The parade entries were assembled in splendid order on the intersection streets between the schools, with Robert Goetz in charge, and an estimate of between 55 and 60 floats, autos, trucks and various vehicles, all displaying the NRA emblem and a banner or two telling the world which house was represented. Silverton Hills orchestra and Rude Benson's old-time musicians played through the 45 minute line. More than a hundred school children were torch carriers, many in costumes.

The streets were brilliantly lighted with hundreds of fuses and Alfred Adams' theater broadcasting system made the especially entertaining program audible to the thousands who thronged the streets.

Two after events were appreciated. The head of the general committee, Lowell Hobitt, was host on behalf of the local business firms at a banquet for entertainers in the grill room of Tony's Eat Shop; and the fire department gave a dance at the armory to which throngs assembled and were entertained by Nate's Rhythm players in stunts and dance music until well into the morning. The decorations were unusual with the large auditorium transformed into a colonnaded bower and "new deal" screens that represented four queens were original ideas of Knute Digness, local artist.

Herman Kramer was master of ceremonies and Rev. C. J. Hall was program chairman. The numbers included a violin solo by Beryl O'way, Fern Davenport on the piano; Buddy Sewell, Pauline Zoe Chambers, Jean Adams and Jean Bates, in special dances, from the Barbara Barnes school of the dance in Salem; Oliver Carpenter and Joe Hassenstab in a bar and xylophone duet; the Rude Benson old-time group appearing in costume, including Art Canoy, Rude Benson, H. Windows were displayed previous to the parade formation, and were arranged attractively. No prizes were offered.
