

WOODBURN POST ARMISTICE DAY PROGRAM TOPIC

Woodburn—Elaborate plans for the third annual Armistice day celebration were adopted by Woodburn Post No. 46, American Legion, at the regular meeting held in the armory, Wednesday evening.

A street parade and patriotic program will be held in the forenoon, a football game between Woodburn high school and Chemawa will be the main feature of the afternoon and the day will close with a big dance in the armory at night. Dinner will be served in the armory at noon by the auxiliary.

Sid George of Eugene has been invited to give the main address at the morning program. The parade will include the Hubbard community band, the "Hungry Seven," Howitzer company, Woodburn post and auxiliary, Spanish War Veterans, G. A. R., Gold Star Mothers, fraternal organizations, Junior Legion north-west, baseball champions, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls, and pet parade. It is also planned to have a section of the parade as a costume parade with girls in all grade schools in the vicinity taking part. Prizes will be awarded for the most appropriate costumes and also for the best unit. Oliver S. Olson is in charge of the parade and will be assisted by H. M. Austin and Milton Coy.

A. S. Adams is to be chairman of the military police to direct the crowds and preserve order; H. Stinson is chairman of the refreshments committee, Sam Yoder is in charge of decorations along the line of the parade and O. S. Olson decorations at the armory. A. G. Glatt will have charge of the dance, S. F. Scollard will be in charge of the football game with H. F. Butterfield and A. E. Miller as gatekeepers. H. S. LeFebvre will supervise the erection of a reviewing stand, A. J. Beck will head the committee on window decorations, L. C. Buchner will act as cashier for the day and Rodney Alden will be chairman of the committee on publicity. Business houses will be asked to close during the time of the parade, from 10:30 to 12:30 o'clock.
