

STAYTON PLAYS HOST TO COUNTY P.T.A. MEMBERS

There were several numbers by the Christian church orchestra.

Mrs. Pulkerson sent greetings. Mrs. H. E. Tobie of Stayton has been appointed program chairman for the county meetings. Mrs. Carl Speck of Silverton, publicity; Mr. Unshauer of Turner, health. Rev. George Cole led a round-table discussion on "What Kind of a P.T.A. I Would Like to Have," which was very interesting. Mr. Lowe of Aumsville helped with the discussion.

Robert Goetz of Silverton, talked on "Murder in the First Degree," and gave the ten following examples of how a P.T.A. might be murdered: A disbelief in its value; inactivity; superintending, principals and teachers do not attend P.T.A.; if the association is used merely as a bureau to register complaints against teachers; to have meetings where the entire program is always furnished by the teachers and pupils; an association which excludes the teachers; where the teachers are permitted to take part but with no continuity of programs or talks; for certain groups or cliques to run everything; to not allow the primary purpose to be that of just making money and if the main energy of that organization is used in making money it will be killed; too much business transacted by the executive committee.

Dr. B. F. Pound, Salem, responded with the slogan "Long Live P.T.A." and stated that we need trained parents who are interested and efficient and who cannot over estimate the value of a good P.T.A. and who will give cooperation with the teachers and leaders.

The program was closed with a splendid group of numbers by the boys and girls of Chemawa Indian school under the direction of Prof. Turley.

BUDGET MEETING MT. ANGEL HALL SET NEXT MONTH

Mt. Angel—The preliminary budget was submitted to the city council by the budget committee and calls for approximately the same amount of money to be raised by taxation as last year, a total of \$3,362.50 compared to \$3,433.33 in 1932. The water rental receipts for the coming year were estimated at \$1000 less than last year.

The council called for a budget hearing November 6 at 7:30 o'clock at the city hall, when any taxpayer who shall be subject to the tax levy may appear before the council for or against the tax levy on any item. Total expenditures for 1934 are estimated at \$4612.50 of which \$3362.50 must be raised by taxation. Receipts from rentals, fines, etc., are figured to net \$100, and \$1150 will come from the county road fund. Last year \$4633.33 was the estimated total expenditures. The 1934 budget includes retiring of \$1000 in building fund warrants, (city hall).

Receipts from the city water system are estimated at \$4700 compared to \$5700 last year. The decrease will take place after the Mt. Angel cremery finishes installation of a pumping plant to supply the greater part of its water. The decrease in receipts from this source will be partially offset by a drop in the power bill.

Expenditures from the water fund include retiring of \$1000 in water bonds. The amount to be levied to retire general obligation bonds is \$500. The city tax levy is expected to be slightly lower than last year. Decrease in property valuation was made up by new construction.

ALBANY GIVEN INDUSTRY FUND FOR STIMULUS

Albany—Larger payrolls for Albany are in the offing, and continuation of local industries is assured with the formation of the Industrial Loan corporation, which has taken final form this week and is a subsidiary of the NRA, it was announced Friday by members of the corporation, Dr. B. R. Wallace, Percy A. Young and R. C. Miller.

The newly formed concern will be exactly like a bank in its functions and will provide ample loans to a number of business and manufacturing concerns in Oregon which are in need of assistance. Money will be made available through the reconstruction finance corporation and all loans will be secured by first mortgages on property and materials worth as much as or more than the loans.

This is the first corporation of its kind in the state of Oregon, and already loans are being sought from many parts of this state and northern California through the local unit.

Money will be advanced to manufacturers upon an inventory by R. F. C. appraisers on raw materials and materials in the process of manufacture. Loans will thus be made available to corporations whose assets are adequate but whose present operating capital is insufficient to permit them to conform to increased employment and wage scale provisions of national recovery codes. The loans will bridge the gap between present manufacturing and distribution costs and future returns from marketed products.

Miller in speaking of the venture stated that the corporation would be a private concern controlled by and under supervision of the federal government. In explaining the working policy of the organization, he said the Industrial Loan corporation would take the loans and then obtain the money through R. F. C. which would appraise the property and contents before lending the money, or in other words, rediscunt the loan.

A large number of Albany concerns are eager for the loans which, it was learned, may run for as long as three years. Victor Oliver of Albany will be attorney for the corporation.

TRUCK DRIVERS ARE NOT HELD

Woodburn—Six truck drivers, arrested by state police under the new law, charged with operating a truck as a motor carrier without a permit from the utilities commissioner were represented in court before Judge Overton Friday afternoon by their attorneys, Pope and Cupper of Salem. The case was dismissed by the judge for the reason that he considered the act under which they were arrested as unconstitutional and that not sufficient facts were before him to justify holding the defendants guilty.

Judge Overton holds the act un-

constitutional and void for the reason that it combines the legislative, administrative and judicial powers of the state, and vests three powers in the commissioner; it gives preference and priority to certain applicants over others; the main object of the act is to destroy all competition in the transportation of persons and property on the public highway and to destroy all individual carriers.
