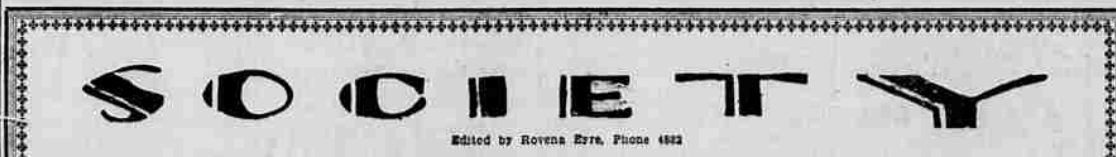
The noon luncheon was provided by the Jefferson Woman's club and served in the dining room of the Christian church.
