FIRST OIL DERRICK BEING CONSTRUCTED

Jefferson—The first oil derrick in Marion county is being erected this week on the Steiner farm five miles north of Jefferson, where a standard rig is being installed. Drilling will probably be resumed about December 1. A depth of 910 feet was reached with the small derrick. The men in charge of the drilling figure that gas sand will be reached at about 1220 feet and that oil will come somewhere between 1600 and 1700 feet. If no oil is struck at that depth they are prepared to carry the 10-inch casing 2000 feet if necessary. The casing has already been set to a depth of 370 feet. No more can be done with the small derrick which was used for the first 910 feet.

About 2300 acres of land north of here including the large Steiner holdings, are under lease to Charles S. B. Henry and associates.

RIVER WING DAMS READY

TURKEY PRICE HAS INTEREST OF PRODUCERS

Amity—The turkey marketing school being conducted at Hopewell by Joe W. Jarvis, instructor of vocational agriculture, Amity high school, completed the second meeting Thursday night. Since the growers of this district have been undecided as to where they would market their turkeys this year, J. C. Leedy, manager of the Oregon turkey cooperatives, was secured to give the advantages of marketing through the organization.

Leedy explained the value of the Hopewell turkey growers joining the Oregon cooperatives. He related the history of the Roseburg turkey growers' association and showed how cooperative selling is more profitable to the people of this district, than other methods of marketing that are not certain.

This year the growers around Hopewell will have about seven car loads of turkeys to be marketed. Leedy stated that "the association would load turkeys in one locality where there are at least one-half car load or more. This is done so as to keep the marketing cost down for the grower."

Price is the main point of interest to the people here, continued Leedy. The association is in a position to pay a good payment down which will be an advance of 12 cents a pound on U. S. Prime turkeys and 10 cents on U. S. Choice turkeys. Since the turkeys have not been sold the Oregon association cannot pay the total amount in full at the time the turkeys are received. He also pointed out that the association never ships any birds on consignment.

Over a period of years the association has stabilized prices and is interested in the profit received by the grower instead of some individual being more interested in the profit for his firm.

The turkey price has been up to 23 and 25 cents a pound the past week, and no doubt the reduction in turkeys raised has an effect on the price. There is a reduction of 10 to 20 per cent in market turkeys grown this year in the northwest and in Oregon several district reports a decrease of 50 per cent in production, continued Mr. Leedy.

The cold storage companies October 1st were holding 2,787,000 pounds. This is about 34 per cent less than the five year average.

SCRIP ISSUE AT SILVERTON FOR TEACHERS

Silverson—A called session of the Silverson business and professional men Friday evening at the Ames club rooms was of special interest in the discussion of a second issue of scrip to relieve the non-cash warrant condition facing teachers and other connected with the schools who are paid with county warrants. Norris Ames presided.

Two weeks ago the teachers conferred with each business firm in town, presenting a petition asking their cooperation in accepting scrip as a substitute for warrants of larger denomination that could not so easily be disposed of. A few heads of business houses were unwilling to accept scrip in exchange for goods and in consequence the scrip has not been issued. When conditions became embarrassing beyond reason last year the local American Legion post sponsored the issuance of scrip with the Al Coolidge company backing the project, but so far this school year has seen no cash of scrip relief for teachers who have to depend on their wages for a living.

Heads of the concerns who opposed the issuance of scrip were reported absent at the meeting Friday evening but those attending voted a willingness to cooperate in some way to relieve the congestion. A committee was appointed to confer with the Legion and to report their findings in the near future.

A scrip plan for relief was proposed by Earl Adams which met with instant favor but was only discussed. His idea was for the head of some local industry to deposit an amount equal to a small per cent of the employee's wage, pay that per cent in scrip and under certain time restrictions allow the scrip to be redeemed in the deposited cash, and during the next month repeat the cycle of exchange, providing of course, that all merchants were willing to cooperate.

No teachers were reported present Friday evening.
