

DRUNK DRIVER IS GIVEN BIG JOLT IN COURT

Woodburn—The trial of A. E. Perry of Portland, arrested on a charge of driving while drunk after his car had collided with a truck driven by Leslie R. Anderson of Eugene who filed the charge, was heard before Judge Hiram Overton Tuesday and Perry was given a fine of \$500 and 90 days in the county jail.

Witnesses were Dr. P. T. Burke of Hubbard, Parley Morgan, state police officer and Anderson, private prosecutor. The defendant was represented by Attorney W. W. McKinney of Salem. Notice of appeal was given.

A preliminary hearing was given to Nick Sabe, arrested for trespassing upon the lands of Mrs. Pauline McGuire and removing dirt therefrom, with Blaine McCord as attorney for the defense and Lyle Page, deputy district attorney, acting for the state. Sabe was held to answer to the circuit court. Witnesses for the prosecution were Mrs. McGuire and her husband, John Fikan, Chas. L. Ogle, and F. A. Baker. On behalf of the defendant were O. A. Kunkle, H. C. O'Neill and J. L. Hopkins.

The case of Frank Solich and John Solich, charged with larceny, was transferred to the juvenile court, the defendants being under the age of 18 years. The boys, whose ages are 12 and 16, were arrested on complaint of Antoine Hanauka by whom they are charged with stealing a bicycle.

TORCH PARADE EQUIPMENT HAS PAST HISTORY

Silverton—The torches used in the recent NRA parade that was such a success in Silverton, have a history all their own and from the review of their existence by George Custer one might almost wonder if the torches were democratically animated.

The history of the torches runs something like this: George Manolis, always foremost in boosting his home town, was cleaning house in the basement of his place of business near the time that the idea was talked of and discovered these old-time torches left there since the late A. P. Simeral had a shoe shop in the building. He immediately advocated a torch parade, using the two score or more of the lights and the committee liked the suggestion. In short they staged a torch parade that was a hit.

George Custer, for several years one of Silverton's faithful democrats is the best authority on the bringing of the torches to Silverton. He paid 16 cents each for 150 of them himself and helped elect Cleveland to his first term of office. Later 300 of the Silverton torches were loaned to Portland paraders to emulate the several campaigns for Bryan.

"And when we staged a real live parade with those torches we had the Republicans scared to death," stated Mr. Custer. In answer to the question where the torches were now as only about half the original number are here, Mr. Custer said that they were used for night fishing when that was in vogue and the fishers forgot to return them.

The torches are more tin cans with a ball handle soldered on the sides about the center, a wick is in the small opening at the top of the can and the torch is hung on a stick about five feet long. The can is filled with kerosene and the parades is on.

Silverton plans to keep these relics for state occasions.
