INDEPENDENCE MAN WINS FEDERAL SUIT

Independence—Green McElmurry formerly of this city but now of Eugene, has been awarded a judgment against the government for \$13,800—payment of a \$19,000 insurance policy which he carried during the World War. The verdict calls for the payment of \$57.50 a month and interest at 6 per cent since April 1, 1919, totalling about \$7000 in cash at this time and a continuation of the \$57.50 rate for the balance of the 20 year period.

The case was tried before Judge McNary, with Elmer Barnhart, Independence, attorney, representing McElmurry. The case was opened last Friday and continued through Monday and Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, the verdict being returned in 43 minutes after the jury received its instructions from the court.

Claim was based upon total and permanent disability, and a number of witnesses were called in his behalf. The government also subpoenaed witnesses from the vicinity in which McElmurry formerly lived.
