

NEWLY WEDDED PAIR IN JAIL ON HONEYMOON

Woodburn—Harold Ames and Mrs. Rose Sofich of Woodburn are spending their honeymoon in the Marion county jail charged with the theft of 3000 pounds of seed onions from a Japanese farmer at Lake Lahish, and warrants for Louis Sofich and Roy Alphin have been issued on the same charge.

Two sons of Mrs. Sofich, Frank and John, were recently arrested for the theft of a bicycle from A. P. Hanauka, and when state police visited the Sofich home on Tout street in search of the bicycle the onions were discovered and the suspicions of the officers aroused, resulting in the arrest of the pair. The next day after being questioned by the police Mrs. Sofich and Ames went to Vancouver and were married.

When brought before Judge Overton they entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of theft and bonds were fixed at \$250 each. Being unable to raise the money they were taken to the county jail to spend their honeymoon in separate cells. The two boys were turned over to the juvenile court. Police have recovered 800 pounds of the stolen onions, which are stored in the city hall. Mrs. Sofich or Ames was also arrested a short time before for driving without an operator's license.

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FIFTH TURKEY SCHOOL DRAWS AMITY PEOPLE

Amity—The turkey evening school held at Hopewell school Monday night by Joe W. Jarvis, instructor of vocational agriculture, at the Amity union high school, was the fifth of the series of discussion meetings.

Some discussion was held on the price of turkeys and the remainder of the evening was spent on the discussion of selecting birds for killing.

It has been arranged for the meeting to be held Thursday night with Prof. F. E. Fox, assistant professor of poultry, lead the group discussion on killing and dressing of turkeys. Professor Fox has had years of experience in this work and for that reason the people of this district interested in turkey raising should hear the discussion.

Many people are killing birds now and do not doubt the same thing will happen this year as has happened in years past, fine birds will not be killed properly and this will put them in the number 2 class instead of the first grade. Turkeys that are to be killed should be full-fledged, fully covered with fat, free from temporary blemishes, such as torn skin or bruised flesh, practically free from pin feathers and free from disease.

The growers in this district are noted for their fine birds produced. They always take the feed away from the birds 18 to 24 hours before slaughtering but they allow free access to water.

Professor Fox has always recommended that the killing and plucking be done as promptly as possible. A regular sticking knife is used, the turkey's mouth is held open and the back of the head is laid in the palm of the left hand. The knife is passed through the turkey's mouth and a cut is made across the throat in a diagonal direction from left to right just back of the angle of the jaw. This operation must be done properly for the turkey to bleed freely.

As soon as the veins are severed, the knife is thrust through the mouth in a line just below the eye to the rear lobe of the brain. The rear lobe of the brain must be pierced or the bird will not pluck easily. The feathers must be plucked at once, being careful not to tear the skin of the bird.
