DEFECTIVE TEETH SHOWN BY CLINIC

Silverton—An infant and preschool clinic will be held in the nurse's room of the Eugene Field building Tuesday afternoon. Those wishing may have their children examined physically, given vaccinations or tuberculin tests.

An official report from the examinations of members of the sophomore class of the senior high school shows 32 boys and 54 girls examined. Defects among the girls: Teeth, 30; tonsils, 9; thyroid, 4; vision, 4; heart, 4. Corrections made decreased the showings to 18 teeth, 5 tonsils, and 2 vision. Defects of the boys examined showed: teeth 39, tonsils, 6; thyroid, 3; heart, 2; vision, 1; hearing, 3. Corrections showed: tonsils, 5, teeth, 7.
